Black + *Dada: The Black Arts Movement and the European Avant-Garde* – On Saturday, November 30, 2pm, the Main Library (in the Bradley Walters Community Room; 125 14th Street) is offering a public lecture by Dr. Thomas Haakenson about an important cultural movement that began in the 1960s and continues to this day. In the 1960s, the Black Arts Movement (BAM) – and especially Amiri Baraka's groundbreaking poem "Black Dada Nihilismus" – opened the door for a radical engagement with the European avant-garde. Dr. Haakenson will discuss how the current "Black Dada" movement, with its roots in Baraka's poetic revolution, continues to teach us about race, history, and community. Dr. Haakenson is Treasurer of the German Studies Association and Associate Professor of Critical Studies & Visual Studies at the California College of the Arts. This lecture is a joint effort of the Oakland Public Library, the German Studies Association, and the Goethe Institute, as part of the "Deutschlandjahr USA" (Year of German-American Friendship, or #WunderbarTogether).

Become a certified IRS Tax Preparer and help low-income families file their taxes at no-cost! – The City of Oakland needs your help in volunteering to prepare hundreds of Earned Income Tax Credit

(EITC) tax returns for eligible low-income earners for the upcoming 2020-tax season. The EITC and Cal/EITC is a refundable federal and state income tax credit for low-income working individuals and families. The Earned Income Tax Credit is the most effective anti-poverty strategy and lifts more working families out of poverty than any other federal program. With the combined federal and state credits, eligible families can get *up to* \$6,000 back after filing their taxes. Last year alone, the coalition of FREE Volunteer Income Tax Assistant (VITA) sites brought back over \$12.4 million to Oakland's low-income families and with your help we can even do more!

How to get involved?

The City Administrator has once again granted city workers up to 4 hours bi-weekly of paid city time, pending approval from their supervisor, to volunteer! The City of Oakland, in partnership with the Oakland Business Assistant Center, will once again host its Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) site at 270 Frank H Ogawa Plaza.
