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Dear Community,

To all of our community members: may this be a merry season of celebration for you and your families! In this time of giving and sharing, as we come together as different communities, I encourage us to share in our differences with love and openness. Whether it's Hanukkah, which begins at sunset on the 7th, Winter Solstice on the 21st, Christmas on the 25th, Kwanzaa on the 26th, or Friday prayers, Oakland celebrates with you!

This month is also Universal Human Rights Month, and as the weather becomes colder and wet, I want to uplift our unhoused residents, and remind everyone that, regardless of our mental health status, socio-economic status, race, age or identity, we all deserve stable shelter safe from the elements, food, and water. While houselessness is a complex issue that won't be solved overnight, I urge residents to do what they can to donate lightly used clothing, shelf-stable and non-perishable foods, and other necessary items, like hygiene kits, to local organizations doing the work of supporting our low income and unhoused neighbors. There are a plethora of organizations that you can donate to or volunteer with, such as Oakland Trybe, Covenant House, Family Bridges, Urban University, the Center for Employment Opportunities, and so many more to choose from!

Council and Community Safety Updates

Community safety continues to be our top priority. I share your concerns and want you to know that your City is working hard and collaboratively for a safer Oakland. I remain committed to comprehensive safety solutions that I shared in my August newsletter: (1) Addressing the root causes of violence and poverty, (2) Preventing violence, retaliation and recidivism, and (3) Improving response times to crises and solving more crimes.

At our **November 7th Council Meeting**, the Council approved these items:

- Budget amendment of up to \$2.5 million to improve 9-1-1. CMs Kaplan, Fife, Jenkins, Mayor Thao and I proposed and the Council approved allocating newly available funds to improve 9-1-1 dispatch, and recruitment and retention of workers.
- OPD staffing study. This is a critical study by the Office of the Inspector General to continue expanding
 Oakland's holistic community safety system. The study was directed by the Council in 2021 as part of my
 Council President's policy directives and by the Reimagining Public Safety Task Force to: further analyze
 calls for service to recommend transferring or deprioritizing certain low levels calls, to further recommend
 civilianization of sworn positions, among other things. The Council approved the contract for this study.

On **November 28th the City Council and our public safety boards/commissions held our annual meeting to review how Measure Z funds have been used** to reduce crime through violence prevention and reduction services and programs. Measure Z — the Public Safety and Services Violence Prevention Act of 2014 — is a critical part of our community safety infrastructure raising about \$28 million each year to support Police, Fire and Violence Prevention. You can access the presentations and view the video of the public safety meeting here. Highlights of the meeting include:

- The Safety & Services Oversight Commission shared recommendations including: a system for verifying alarms; since 98% are false alarms, a verification system would allow OPD to better respond to other 911 calls for service; and promoting the direct line to Fire Dispatch 510-444-1616 to help prevent 911 hold times.
- The Fire Department shared that a dedicated phone number for MACRO community responders will go live by January. OFD is filling 16 additional MACRO positions and expanding from 2 to 3 shifts, while a March Fire Academy will bring about 35 new firefighters.
- The Department of Violence Prevention shared that Measure Z supports a majority (78%) of their services for group/gang violence, gender-based violence, community healing and school violence intervention & prevention. Measure Z is critical to supporting violence prevention and other safety services.
- The Police Department shared that their homicide clearance/solve rates are going up since fully staffing this unit; and a new Police Academy is graduating over 20 new officers. The Ceasefire Program focuses on individuals who are at the center of violence. They reported that shootings have decreased since 2021 and a Ceasefire audit will be available soon to further focus this strategy for reducing violence.
- The Police Commission shared that they will give Mayor Thao a list of 3 candidates for Police Chief in early December.

This holiday season, the City is ramping up efforts to ensure community safety:

- Five After Five secure downtown parking allows downtown visitors and workers to park at the Franklin Plaza Parking Garage at 19th Street & Franklin Street for a flat rate of \$5 on weekdays after 5pm and all day on weekends.
- Think Oakland First is a new partnership with Visit Oakland to support local businesses, explore vibrant neighborhoods, and enjoy added safety with extra police officers and safety ambassadors. Shop, dine, and celebrate responsibly.
- Activate Oakland Grantees have been announced! 38 sponsorships will activate public spaces and support more than 120 community events in Oakland's downtown and neighborhood commercial areas. The events will occur in 18 of Oakland's commercial districts, supporting hundreds of small businesses, artists, and arts and culture organizations into next year.

Finally, at our **November 27th Special Council meeting**, the City Council unanimously passed a resolution **Affirming Oakland's Support For The Congressional And Worldwide Calls For Immediate Ceasefire In Gaza**. I encourage you to read the resolution in its entirety here, and my personal letter to Pres. Biden and Congress supporting a ceasefire is here. I mourn and condemn each innocent life lost in Palestine, Israel & here at home. Let's honor our humanity by fighting for a world where everyone can live in peace and dignity with equal rights and self determination.

Thank you for your continued partnership with me, my Office and Oakland to improve our City.

Tuesday 12/5: Council Meeting Preview

Rent Legislation, San Antonio Park Master Plan, Reusable Foodware, Safe Work Zones and More!

Here are some highlights of our upcoming Special City Council Meeting on December 5th, 2023, at 3:30pm:

Consent Items:

- Item #3.1 AC Transit Update On Its Realign Bus Network Project.
- Item #6.6 Ordinance Adding A Firearm Procurement Policy To The Oakland Municipal Code, from Councilmembers Kalb and Kaplan: an ordinance mandating that manufacturers and sellers maintain certification of compliance with local, state, and federal law, and prohibiting contracts with retailers and manufacturers that won't comply.
- Item #6.17 Safe Work Zone Ordinance, from Public Works: an ordinance adding to the Oakland Municipal Code the ability to establish safe work zones for public employees carrying out work, and to make failure to leave a designated area a misdemeanor.
- Item #6.29: Reusable Foodware And Plastic Litter Reduction Ordinance, from Councilmembers Kalb and Gallo: an ordinance aimed at reducing litter by requiring reusable utensils be used at in-store locations, allowing customers to bring their own take out containers, requiring reusable beverage containers at City facilities, discouraging buying bottled water, and more.
- Item #6.30 San Antonio Park Master Plan, from Public Works: a resolution adopting the San Antonio Park Master Plan. Thank you to the Friends of San Antonio Park and our community for engaging in creating a shared vision for this plan.

Non-Consent Items:

- Item #9: ABC Security Services Inc. Increase Spending Authority, from Public Works: a resolution authorizing the City Administrator to increase and continue a contract with ABC Security Services in an amount not to exceed \$3.5 million.

 and other changes.
- A resolution Adopting Amendments To The Rent Adjustment Program Regulations To: (1) Remove The Requirement That A Tenant Be Current On Rent In Order To File Or Respond To A Petition With The Rent Adjustment Program; (2) Extend The Amortization Period For Mandatory Seismic Retrofits To 25 Years; (3) Reduce Appeal Argument Time To Six Minutes Per Party; (4) Remove The Appearance Requirement For Appellant At Appeal Hearings; (5) Allow Rent Board Alternates To Participate In Board Meetings In Non-Voting Capacity; (6) Add Good Cause Hearings For Failure To Appear At Hearings; (7) Change Meeting Time To 6:00 PM; (7) Codify Existing Procedural Practices In Regulations; And (8) Make Other Clarifying Changes.

Pine Knoll Park

• Thank you to the many residents who have engaged our District 2 Office and City Staff to ensure safety and equity at Pine Knoll Park. On November 20th, city staff closed the park and installed fencing to implement restorations and improvements to the park. The improvements will restore grass, landscaping, and irrigation infrastructure damaged by illegal motorcycle / ATV sideshow activity at the park. The City will be considering additional new design features to discourage or prevent destructive activity, consistent with the City's ongoing engagement with neighborhood advocates and the Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) process conducted at this site. Council President Bas has worked with city staff from the City Administrator's Office, OPD, Park Services and Facilities to address the impact of sideshows and other prohibited activities on community safety; park wildlife, environment and infrastructure; and residents' quality of life. In addition, the existing restroom structure, which is not ADA-compliant, will be removed. A new "Portland Loo" will be installed nearby on Lakeshore Avenue for the use of all lake and park visitors. The Portland Loo is a state-of-the-art public restroom, which Council President Bas added to the city budget, similar to the one at Astro Park near the Lake's Pergola. The infrastructure for the public bathroom is already being installed across the street and it should be completed by mid-December. We look forward to continuing to share updates and to collaborating on keeping our parks safe and accessible for all.

San Antonio

• The San Antonio Park Master Plan will be heard at the Special Council Meeting on December 5th, 2023! The Master Plan's passage will mean that the City can begin the Feasibility Study for the Community Library and Resilience Center, as well as begin planning and implementation of the new playground! - **Sidewalk Parking:** At the September 12, 2023 Public Works and Transportation Committee meeting, the Committee received an informational report on sidewalk parking that clarifies parking on sidewalks is illegal

under federal, state and local laws; this ensures that the public right of way is available to pedestrians. This issue impacts narrow streets across the City including in District 2, where streets such as Underhills, Balfour, Ashmount and Hillsborough have engaged with our office. OakDOT is conducting education and engagement to ensure consistency in enforcement. In November, staff began issuing warning citations. **Full enforcement has been postponed from the original January 1st, 2024 date** due to both staffing as well as requests for clarification on exactly how the City will enforce sidewalk parking. Our District 2 Office will continue to engage with impacted residents and will convene a meeting with OakDOT once further guidance has been clarified.

Rapid Response Homeless Housing (R2H2)

The City of Oakland Department of Housing and Community Development (City) seeks proposals for the creation of permanent, interim, or transitional housing for people experiencing homelessness through a Request for Proposals (City Homekey RFP). More information here: oaklandca.gov/topics/city-homekey.

HCD anticipates providing at least \$10,400,740 in capital and \$19,667,562 in operating funding for homeless housing projects with this initial tranche of funding. Responses to the R2H2 RFP will also serve as applications for the State's potential Homekey Round 4 funding opportunity. Though applications for R2H2 will be accepted on a rolling basis, projects that wish to apply for the potential Homekey Round 4 will have a <u>due date of February 29, 2024.</u> Projects that can proceed *without* Homekey funding are also welcome to apply.
