# **City Council Updates**

At our **October 3rd Council meeting**, the City Council took these actions:

- created an action plan for improvements and investments in our 9-1-1 system. The Administration and Council detailed a plan to improve 9-1-1 staffing, implement and improve IT infrastructure, update an emergency operations plan, and invest an additional \$2.5 million. - continued critical violence prevention programs, focusing on group and gang violence, gender-based violence, community healing and employment. I'm grateful to my budget team for adding funds to our two-year budget in June to make this possible, and to Mayor Thao and Public Safety Chair Rebecca Kaplan who identified cost savings to continue the employment programs. Thanks to the many people who shared your views and stories with us. Read more here in the East Bay Times.

At our **October 17th Council meeting**, the City Council took these actions:

- Approved Corridor Safety Ambassadors Grants. With \$1 million that I added to our budget in June, Council approved grants to support community ambassadors and safety measures in our high priority commercial corridors with the highest levels of crime, employment, and tax revenue Downtown, Fruitvale and Hegenberger. District 2 neighborhoods are included in the Downtown grant. I will continue to work with other D2 commercial corridors on neighborhood-specific safety measures. In addition, my direct community grant to Restore Oakland will support organizing small business corridors without a merchants organization to make business and corridor improvements in collaboration with our City departments. - Approved Automated License Plate Reader Cameras. Mayor Thao secured \$1.2 million from the State to install a new network of 300 automated license plate reader (ALPR) cameras throughout Oakland. These cameras would allow law enforcement to identify and track vehicles involved in criminal activity, in real time, using license plate, make, model, color, and unique features of a vehicle. At the Council meeting, I added measures to help track the effectiveness of these cameras in reducing and solving crimes, including launching a Transparency Portal when the program begins and reporting to the Council's Public Safety Committee after three months. - Extended the Flex Streets Program Public Street Closures. Many businesses have shared
  positive feedback about the City's Flex Streets Program, and Councilmember Fife sponsored
  legislation to reinstate the program until December 31, 2025. This will facilitate public street
  closures for restaurant, retail, café, parklet, and other businesses to close and use public
  right-of-ways to encourage public safety, business development, and healthy outdoor use and
  enjoyment of public spaces.

### **Law Enforcement Updates**

In case you missed these updates, the **City and OPD are focused on improving response and solving more crimes**:

- Meet our OPD Area Commander, Capt. Alan Yu. On August 11th, I was pleased to join the OPD Awards and Promotions Ceremony and congratulate Captain Alan Yu on his promotion to Captain and Area 3 Commander. He has served with OPD for 20 years. He and I have already worked together through his prior role leading the Special Victims Unit where we collaborated on addressing human trafficking; and in his volunteer role mentoring Asian youth with the Asian Youth Services Committee. Many neighbors have been getting to know him in our Neighborhood Council meetings.
- Foot patrols are back in our business districts thanks in part to a 3-year federal grant. At our September Grand Lake Neighbors meeting, we welcomed Ofc. Mike Cooper who is patrolling Lakeshore and Grand Avenues; and at the Lincoln Summer Nights Mid Autumn Festival, we re-connected with Ofc. Tony Chang who is patrolling Chinatown, a beat he previously had for four years. These teams across the entire city are building relationships with businesses and neighbors in our commercial corridors to help boost community safety.
- CHP is patrolling 2 days a week on local highways such as International and Hegenberger. Having a CHP Sergeant and 6 Officers on our streets means OPD can focus on violent crimes in other critical areas.
- Targeted enforcement has led to the following arrests:
  - On September 21, it was announced that a <u>national partnership with the U.S. Marshalls</u> <u>led to 137 arrests in Oakland</u>, including 31 individuals allegedly involved in homicides, 20 related to assault, 4 for sex offenses, 27 for robberies and 26 for weapon offenses.
  - On September 28, Mayor Thao and OPD announced an expansion of the Ceasefire Strategy which led to the <u>arrest of 10 suspected gang members they said were</u> <u>connected to car jackings, armed robberies and car burglaries</u>.
  - On October 3, OPD and Mayor Thao announced that <u>7 people were arrested in an undercover auto burglary operation</u>. The Alameda County District Attorney's Office charged 6 of the individuals for their involvement in the crimes.
  - On October 13, OPD announced <u>recent arrests of individuals connected to armed</u> <u>robberies</u>, <u>car jackings</u>, <u>and convenience store robberies</u>, including incidents in District 2 neighborhoods.

# **Traffic Safety Updates**

- I recently met with OakDOT and AC Transit about the "Quick Build" project along
  International Blvd. to increase traffic safety. Please stay tuned for a community meeting this
  Fall to hear more about the projects which include interventions in District 2 corridors where
  traffic injuries and fatalities have occurred.
- I have also met with the family of Maia, a 4 year old whose life was lost after a bike collision on Lakeshore Ave. After advocating together for a near-term solution, <u>OakDOT has agreed to</u> <u>create protected bike lanes on Lakeshore — years ahead of schedule</u>, as it continues to equitably address safety in our High Injury Network.
- In September, I joined City leaders to announce <u>lower speed limits of 20 mph in 11</u> <u>commercial districts</u> as part of California Pedestrian Safety Month.
- Gov. Gavin Newsom signed AB 645, which allows 6 cities including Oakland to test speed cameras during a five-year pilot program. The bill sets out a collaborative model based on stakeholder input and community engagement to ensure appropriate impact mitigation measures for low-income residents of equity priority communities and strong privacy protections. I've advocated for the passage of this bill along with Oakland's Bike & Pedestrian

Advisory Commission and thank the Governor for allowing Oakland to pilot alternatives to police traffic stops to enforce speed limits.

- MACRO Alternative Crisis Responders: MACRO teams in the Fire Department respond to calls about homelessness, some behavioral or mental health calls, noise complaints, and people appearing drunk (and nonviolent) in public. For non-violent issues, call MACRO at 911 or email macro@oaklandca.gov.
- **Sideshow Tip Line**: Sideshows and related dangerous driving behaviors including "donuts" are a significant safety and quality of life concern for Oakland residents, as well as the region.
