## LINCOLN PARK JUNK BOAT STRUCTURE REPAIR


**What:** Replacement of existing playground surfacing material, and broken play structure elements to the Junk Boat structure, which consists of a double slide, activity panels, and a climbing ladder.

Where: 261 11th St.

Date Completed: September 11th, 2019

Cost: \$195,300

Funding: HUD CDBD Grant

# DIMOND PARK LIONS POOL RENOVATION

**What:** Due to hillside soil movement at Lions Pool, the concrete desk around the pool uplifted, causing potential tripping hazards. Renovations were made to stabilize conditions and comply with regulatory requirements.

Where: 360 Hanly Road

Date Completed: September 20th, 2019

Cost: \$1.69 Million

Funding: Measure KK, Measure HH, and the Sugar-Sweetened

## TASSAFARONGA GYM WATERPROOFING

**What:** This project rehabilitated the building's envelope to stop water intrusions in the gym. It replaced the existing water damage in the indoor sports flooring to resume athletic programs at the facility.

**Where:** 975 85th Ave.

Date Completed: September 2019

Cost: \$584,650

Funding: Measure KK and Housing Related Park Grant

**What:** This project is a 14-acre "complete street" and park expansion project that increases park lands around Lake Merritt and at Snow Park, improves water quality, calms traffic, and dramatically improves pedestrian and bicycle comfort and safety.

Where: Harrison and 20th Streets Date Completed: June 10th, 2019

Cost: \$15.5 Million

Funding: Measure DD, MTC Fund, and Measure B/BB

#### FROG PARK TOT LOT

**What:** The park was expanded to add swings, seesaws, and other play features/structures. Renovation included replacing existing lawn with fresh grass.

Where: 5500 Claremont Ave

Projected Completion Date: February 8th, 2020

Cost: \$160,000

Funding: ADA Improvement Fund, Measure HH, Cal

Trans ACTIA-Grant, and Community Grants

## RAINBOW RECREATION CENTER EXPANSION

**What:** Renovations replaced the existing recreation center, improved the site for ADA accessibility, added a multi-purpose sports field, restored the adjacent creek, and added interpretive education elements, including a new community vegetable garden.

Where: 5800 International Blvd. Date Completed: March 2019

Cost: \$13.7 million

**Funding:** Measure KK, State Park Grant, State Housing Related Parks Grant, State Parks Youth Soccer Grant, Measure WW Bond

#### PERALTA HACIENDA PARK HISTORIC CORE ADOBE PAVILION

**What:** Improvements bring to fruition three key features: a Pavilion, a Community Banquet Table and a Community Oven. Together these features provide a significant new community gathering space and enhance the interpretive performance of this significant historic site.

Where: 2465 34th Ave.

Date Completed: September 26th, 2019

**Cost:** \$873,800

Funding: California Natural Resources Agency 'Museum Grant',

Measure WW Bond, HUD CDBG Grant
