Dear City of Oakland Rent Adjustment Program - Appeal Department,

I am writing in regards to the case listed above L15-0065 CNML Crescent Props LLC v Tenants (Gary Reynolds) and would like to request an appeal based upon the fact, I was denied a sufficient opportunity to present my claim or respond to the petitioner's claim; and the hearing officer would not allow my evidence to be entered into the record which was filed on time and should have been allowed to explain why I was adding the photos. I feel my photos would have explained the many inconsistencies with the workmanship performed by non-professional construction workers, they were day workers. I feel I was discriminated and asked that my evidence be allowed to show just cause to why I feel the work done on the property was not of the best quality and workmanship and we continue to experience problems in my unit even after the fact.

The hearing officer allowed the petitioner to add additional evidence but said he would not allow my evidence because he knows what an apartment building looks like but instead allowed a photocopy a check in the amount of \$122,560 payment for project management to Mr. Gallagher to increase the capital improvement cost. By allowing photocopy of a check not knowing if the check was truly deposited into Mr. Gallagher's account and/or in fact was just a copy of a check with Mr. Gallagher name on it and we know what a check look like. I am asking that my evidence showing that this building has many problems be allowed. Note: Photos will be added to this appeal showing all the problems with this building.

Appeals:

The petitioner request I pay a portion of the replacement invoice for dry rot repair in the amount of \$2,271.

 Is it not my responsibility as a tenant and should be the full responsibility of the owner of said building. Why a tenant should have to be charged for natural causes of wear tear of the building. The upkeep of a building should be the sole responsibility of said owner. The petitioner request I pay a portion of the renovation of said kitchen and bathroom in the amount of \$30,500 and stove for \$10,421.

• There was nothing wrong with the kitchen when I request just a granite counter top. The kitchen was in excellent condition and not damaged in any way. The owner had just put in a new refrigerator and stove no less than six months prior the owner buying the building. I came home one day the entire kitchen was gone without even considering my wishes and I have to pay a portion of something forced upon with intention to use capital improvement to help pay for it and raise my rent at the same time. I should not have to pay for something I already had in the first place.

Also, the previous owner just replaced the tile in the bathroom at the same time due to a water link in the tenant apartment above. He also replaces the vanity and the mirror and the light. There was nothing wrong with my bathroom and again I was shocked they ripped the entire bathroom. My bathroom shower window is so bad that water links onto the walkway outside my window where people walk, and may eventually cause dry rot.

A Capital Improvements was pass through and granted for 209.05 and 89.56 for a period of 24 months. Raising my rent from \$925.00 a month to \$1,223.61 and many others double my amount for this fake capital improvement only use to raise the rent of tenants eventually forcing tenants to move in the end.

• I ask that this case be dismissed based on the fact the hearing was doomed from the beginning when the hearing officer forgot to record the session and requested tenants to return redo the hearing again. To repeat the hearing again would cause hardship for many tenants to when it should have be done correctly in the first place. Because of the hearing officer mistake, I honestly feel it discriminated against tenants who could not return to repeat the hearing again due to the hearing officer mistake. This alone left many tenants what a waste of time only giving the petitioner an edge at the hearing because many tenants present before could not return to the hearing due work and other obligations. Again, this is a form of discriminated against tenants because they could not return. At one point the petitioner tried to remove tenants that could not return and I demanded that they remained on the list. Everything about this capital improvement is FAKE and only being used as a way to increase the rent of tenants not paying market value rent.

I am asking this case be seriously look at and all the dishonesty trickery taking place and the greed of owner/owners trying to make a big payoff due to the local trend taking place in Oakland-Alameda County unlawful housing incensement. Please send a clear signal to owners seeking a big payoff and deny this case for capital improvement.

SUMMARY OF DECISION

The owner's petition is partly granted.

¹ Clifford E. Fried, Marla Bill, Angelita Garrison, Isabel DeCastro, Liz Derias, & Octavio Nevarez appeared only on March 8, 2016. Owen Smithyman appeared only on January 6, 2017.

CONTENTIONS OF PARTIES

The owner filed a petition on October 29, 2015, seeking approval for a rent increase for the subject rental units on the ground of Capital Improvements. The tenants listed above filed responses to the owner's petition.

THE ISSUES

Are rent increases justified by Capital Improvements and, if so, in what amounts?

EVIDENCE

At the Hearing, the parties agreed that the subject building contains 27 rental units.

<u>Capital Improvement Costs – Pre-August 1, 2014:</u> The owner submitted 198 pages of documents. All of the following documents are dated prior to August 1, 2014.² These documents are categorized as follows:

Martin Gallagher Construction Inc. (Gallagher) – Common Area Work:

- An invoice for rebuilding exterior stairs and installation of a new structural steel beam and posts in the amount of \$34,581.50.³ Mr. Gallagher further testified that he has been paid for this invoice, and all of his other invoices that were admitted into evidence;
- an invoice for completion of an exterior stairway in the amount of \$3,625;⁴
- invoices for installation of security gates in the total amount of \$55,000;⁵
- an invoice for exterior painting in the amount of \$48,000;⁶
- an invoice for wood siding and stucco work in the amount of \$60,000;⁷
- an invoice for installation of a water heater in the amount of \$8,300, dated January 27, 2014;⁸
- an invoice for construction in the laundry room in the amount of \$7,000.9
- an invoice for construction of storage rooms in the amount of \$5,200, dated April 3, 2014. 10

At the Hearing on January 6, 2017, the tenants objected to the admission of Exhibit Nos. 195 through 197 – an invoice from and checks to Martin Gallagher Construction – because these documents were not marked as exhibits at the Hearing on March 8, 2016. - an invoice for repair of dry rot, installation of GFCI outlets and driveway work, in the total amount of \$30, 375. ¹³ At the Hearing, Mr. Gallagher testified that when he removed old windows, he discovered dry rot, which needed to be repaired.

FINDINGS OF FACT AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

<u>Capital Improvement Costs:</u> A rent increase in excess of the C.P.I. Rent Adjustment may be justified by capital improvement costs. ¹⁶⁴ Capital improvement costs are those improvements which materially add to the value of the property and appreciably prolong its useful life or adapt it to new building codes. Normal routine maintenance and repair is not a capital improvement cost, but a housing service cost. ¹⁶⁵ A rent increase based upon capital improvements will only be given for those improvements which have been completed and paid for within 24 months prior to the date of the proposed rent increase. ¹⁶⁶

The improvements must primarily benefit the tenant rather than the owner. Items defined as capital improvements will be given a useful life period of 5 years and the total costs shall be amortized over that time period unless the rent increase using this amortization would exceed 10% of the existing rent. Whenever a capital improvement rent increase alone or with any other rent increases would exceed 10% or 30% in 5 years, the excess can only be recovered by extending the amortization period in yearly increments sufficient to cover the excess, and complying with any requirements to notice the tenant of the extended amortization period with the initial capital improvement increase. The dollar amount of the capital improvement rent increase shall be removed from the rent in the sixty-first month or at the end of an extended amortization period. ¹⁶⁷

On August 1, 2014, the Regulations regarding Capital Improvement expenses were amended, in the following ways, for work that was completed and paid for after that date. For work that was completed and paid for prior to August 1, 2014, if the two sets of Regulations conflict, the prior Regulations, sections of which are stated above, apply.

- (1) Whenever a capital improvement rent increase alone or with any other rent increases would exceed 10% in one year or 30% in 5 years, the excess can only be recovered by extending the amortization period in yearly increments sufficient to cover the excess, and complying with any requirements to notice the tenant of the extended amortization period with the initial capital improvement increase. The dollar amount of the capital improvement rent increase shall be removed from the rent in the sixty-first month or at the end of an extended amortization period. ¹⁶⁸
- (2) Beginning on August 1, 2014, a maximum of 70% of the total cost for a capital improvement may be passed through to the tenant. 169
- (3) "This Ordinance shall not apply to capital improvements on which permits have been taken out, unless no permits are required for any of the work, and substantial work is performed and substantial monies paid or liabilities incurred (other than permit fees)

before the implementation date of this Ordinance [August 1, 2014] and the Owner reasonably diligently pursues completion of the work." ¹⁷⁰

The changes in the Ordinance apply to both the 70% calculation and the limitation of rent increases to 10% of the current rent. Neither of these limitations applies to a situation in which substantial work was performed and substantial monies paid or liabilities incurred before August 1, 2014.

<u>Units With No Rent Increase:</u> All work was largely completed and paid for by November 1, 2014. State law provides that, with few exceptions – none of which apply here – "an owner of residential real property may establish the initial rent for a dwelling or unit." Therefore, the rents for the following units – where the tenants moved in after that date – will not be increased, since their initial rents were presumably based upon the condition of the building at the time of move-in. The units are as follows: Units 107, 201, 301, and 305. Further, no rent increase is allowed for the following vacant units, and those with "new tenants": Units 102, 103, & 303.

Effective Date of Rent Increases: The owner's petition was filed on October 29, 2015. As an alternative to filing a petition seeking approval for rent increases, the owner could have served rent increase notices upon the tenants. The owner submitted documentation of costs that, if approved, would increase each tenant's rent by more than 10%. Rent increases greater than 10% require at least 60 days' written notice. Therefore, the earliest effective date for rent increases would have been January 1, 2016.

Costs Allowed and Disallowed: Pre - August 1, 2014:

Common Areas: Construction of stairways, security gates, the laundry and storage rooms, exterior painting, wood siding and stucco work, water heater installation, concrete work, dry rot repair, and GFCI outlet installation in the total amount of \$256,706 is properly documented. This work meets the standards of the Regulations, and primarily benefits all of the tenants, who live in the subject building. Repair of a pipe is routine maintenance, and the cost is not allowed.

However, the owner submitted documentation showing that payments to Gallagher in the total amount of \$199,400¹⁷³ were made before January 1, 2014. This was more than 24 months before the earliest effective date of a rent increase. Therefore, it is proper to deduct \$199,400 from the total costs, reducing the costs to \$57,306. Further, refund checks paid by Gallagher to Lapham Co., which total \$3,500, should also be deducted from the costs, resulting in net costs of \$53,806. Table "A," attached to this Decision, sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work, being \$33.21 per month.

<u>Individual Units:</u> Invoices for some work in individual units are dated before January 1, 2014. However, since there were large payments to Gallagher both before and after January 1, 2014, as itemized above, it is impossible to determine when work in individual units was paid for.

Therefore, all pre-January 1, 2014 payments were deducted from the common area expenses, and not from expenses in any individual unit.

The attached Table "A" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work. Inspection and minor repair to a refrigerator is routine maintenance, and not a capital improvement; the cost is not allowed.

Unit # 103: Since there is a new tenant in this unit, the costs are not an issue in this case.

<u>Unit #104:</u> The cost of new windows and associated dry rot repair in the amount of \$11,271 is properly documented and primarily benefit the tenants. The attached Table "A" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work.

<u>Unit # 105:</u> The cost of new windows and a door, kitchen replacement, and bathroom remodeling in the amount of \$30,200 is properly documented and primarily benefit the tenants. The attached Table "A" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work.

<u>Unit # 106:</u> The cost of a new window, a door, and a stove in the amount of \$6,550 is properly documented and primarily benefit the tenants. The attached Table "A" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work.

The attached Table "A" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work. Minor repairs are routine maintenance, and not a capital improvement; the cost is not allowed.

<u>Unit # 307:</u> The cost of 2 new windows and one door in the amount of \$5,600 is properly documented and primarily benefits the tenants. The attached Table "A" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work.

<u>Unit # 308:</u> The cost of 4 new windows and a new heater in the amount of \$8,783 is properly documented and primarily benefits the tenants. The attached Table "A" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work.

<u>Unit # 401:</u> The cost of 8 new windows, a door, associated dry rot repair, and fairly major work on the roof, in the amount of \$25,355 is properly documented and primarily benefits the tenants. The attached Table "A" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work.

Costs Allowed and Disallowed: Post - August 1, 2014:

<u>Common Areas:</u> Construction clean-up, a "port-a-potty" and the "project management payout" for supervision of the lengthy project, in the total amount of \$128,199 is properly documented. This work meets the standards of the Regulations, and primarily benefits all of the tenants, who live in the subject building. The attached Table "A" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work.

<u>Unit # 101:</u> The cost of work on 2 windows and a new refrigerator, in the amount of \$1,367, is properly documented and primarily benefits the tenants. <u>Unit # 104:</u> The cost of work on 4 windows in the amount of \$1,600 is properly documented and primarily benefits the tenants. The attached Table "B" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work.

<u>Unit # 105:</u> The cost of work on 3 windows and a door in the amount of \$1,400 is properly documented and primarily benefits the tenants. The attached Table "B" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work.

<u>Unit # 106:</u> The cost of work on a window and a door, kitchen and bathroom remodels and hardwood floor installation in the amount of \$38, 650 is properly documented and primarily benefits the tenants. The attached Table "B" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work.

The attached Table "B" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work. Cleaning and minor repairs are regular maintenance; that cost is denied.

<u>Unit # 307:</u> The cost of work on 3 windows and a new range, in the amount of \$1,646, is properly documented and primarily benefits the tenants. The attached Table "B" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work.

<u>Unit # 308:</u> The cost of work for kitchen and bathroom renovations, acoustic ceiling removal, and new flooring in the amount of \$44,285, is properly documented and primarily benefits the tenants. The attached Table "B" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work.

<u>Unit # 401:</u> The cost of work on 7 windows, in the amount of \$3,000, is properly documented and primarily benefits the tenants. The attached Table "B" sets forth the proper calculation for a rent increase based upon this work.

Conclusion: Eligible capital improvement costs were incurred both before and after August 1, 2014. The rules governing these costs are stated above. All costs before August 1, 2014 are to be amortized over 60 months, and passed on to tenants, without regard to the 10% annual limit on rent increases for costs incurred after that date. Post-August 1, 2014 costs are limited to 10% of a tenant's current rent.

The two sections of the Ordinance are properly reconciled by adding to the pre-August 1, 2014 costs an amount not more than 10% of the current rent for any post-August 1, 2014 costs. The proper monthly rent increase for the post-August 1, 2014 costs for each unit is set forth on Table "B." This Table also states the appropriate number of years during which the post-August 2014 costs are amortized. The proper amortization period for each tenant is set forth in the Order below. Each tenant's current rent may be increased by a capital improvement pass-through, as follows:

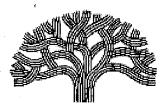

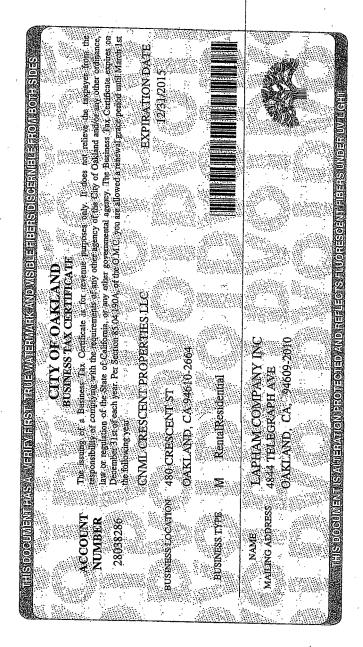

Significant problems prior to 1985: Hospitalized 9/62 for adenotonsillectomy; secondary diagnosis was congenital esophageal web. He underwent dilatetion of the esophagus also. Subsequent upper GI was within normal limits. He was otherwise seen for routine examiantions and minor childhood illness and traumar

Marca 1980 treated with several episodes of genococcal unitariti 9/80 - Episode of Hepatitis A.

9/80 - Recorded that he led a homosexual life style.

5/81 - Seen with infectious illness, specific type unknown, at which time he was noted to have occipital lymphadenopath, also a few bilateral axillaty left inguinal, ? femoral nodes. Impression was Lymphadenopathy, ?etiology. A standard smear revealed 18% atypical lymphs but normal count. Otherwise CBC, urinalysis, chest film, liver function studies and RPR were negative. Heterophile titre, toxoplasm titre -- negative. Also in 1981 it was noted that he was sexually promiscuous. His lymphadenopathy persisted; CMV antibodies outside of reference range. Normal LP 1/2; patient 1/16. Lymphogranulovenereal titre was within the reference range of 1/8. 2/33 - Episode of possible mycoplasma pneumonia; chest film, however, was negative at that time.

Since 1985 he was primerily seen for mild URL.

5/85 - Again noted that he had lymphadenopathy. 5-7mm posterior cervical nodes, 5mm left axillary nodes, lum inguinal nodes. He was clinically without other symptoms. He did not meet criteria for lymphadenopathy syndrome.

BACKGROUND AND SUMMARY OF APPEAL DECISION

A Hearing Decision in this case was issued on September 10, 2015, which granted the owner's petition for exemption based on substantial rehabilitation. The tenant, Jonathan Romano, appealed. An appeal hearing was held on June 9, 2016. The Board remanded the Hearing Decision to the Hearing Officer to determine the following: (1) to determine if the building's total square footage includes the deck, and if so, the decision is affirmed; and (2) if the deck was not included in the building's square footage, the hearing officer is directed to re-calculate the square footage to include the deck based on information in the existing record.

The scope of this Remand Hearing Decision is limited to these two issues.

SUMMARY OF DECISION

The Hearing Decision which granted the owner's petition for exemption based on substantial rehabilitation is affirmed, with the deck included in the square footage.

EVIDENCE AND FINDINGS OF FACT

1. Deck Not Included in the Square Footage

The Alameda County Assessor's Office shows the parcel number and the square footage of 3,582. The square footage of 3,582 was used in the calculation and did not include the new deck.

2. Re-calculation to Include the New Deck

The attached Table "A" states that as of May 1, 2015, the average cost of new construction of apartment buildings of more than 2 units, type V – wood frame

construction, is \$145.07 per square foot. The Table "A" also states that as of May 1, 2015, the average cost of newly constructed elevated decks and balconies is \$44.14 per square foot. The City of Oakland plans shows the new deck is 161 square feet.

To determine if the owner is entitled to the exemption the following calculation is necessary: multiply the square footage (3,582) by \$145.07 plus the square footage of the new deck (161) by \$44.14 and divide that by 2.

 $3,582 \times $145.07 = $519,640.74$ $161 \times $44.14 = $7,106.54$ Total: \$526,747.28 : 2 = \$263,373.64

If the owner spent at least \$263,373.64 on the construction project, the building is exempt from the Rent Ordinance.

The owner provided proof of payments that she spent at least \$319,948.14. Therefore, the building has been "substantially rehabilitated." The rental units in the building are exempt from the Rent Ordinance.

<u>ORDER</u>

- 1. The Hearing Decision regarding owner's petition L15-0016 is affirmed.
- 2. The subject property is exempt from the Rent Adjustment Program as a "substantially rehabilitated" building. The subject property is not exempt from Rent Adjustment Service Fee.
- 3. The Certification of Exemption for the subject building will be issued when this decision becomes final.

Right to Appeal: This decision is the final decision of the Rent Adjustment Program. Either party may appeal this decision by filing a properly completed appeal using the form provided by the Rent Adjustment Program. The appeal must be received within twenty (20) days after service of the decision. The date of service is shown on the attached Proof of Service. If the Rent Adjustment Office is closed on the last day to file, the appeal may be filed on the next business day.

A Hearing Decision was issued which granted an owner's petition for exemption from the Rent Ordinance on the basis of substantial rehabilitation.

Grounds for Appeal-Appeal by Tenant

The tenant filed an appeal on October 6, 2015, on the grounds that the Decision is inconsistent with decisions issued by other hearing officers and that the Decision raises a new policy issue that has not been decided by the Board.

Appeal Decision

After the parties' presentations, rebuttal and questions to the parties K.

Friedman moved to affirm the hearing decision based on the Hearing Officer's rationale. R. Chang seconded. The Board voted as follows:

SUMMARY OF DECISION

The owner's petition is granted. The subject property is exempt from the Rent Adjustment Program.

CONTENTIONS OF THE PARTIES

The owner filed a petition for Certificate of Exemption on the ground of substantial rehabilitation.

The tenants from units 1 and 2 filed timely responses alleging that the remodeling project did not constitute rehabilitation under the ordinance but was deferred maintenance and cosmetic upgrades that should not qualify as substantial rehabilitation.

ISSUE(S)

1. Has the subject property been substantially rehabilitated to be exempt from the Rent Adjustment Program?

EVIDENCE

Notice to all units

The subject property is a residential building consisting of four (4) units. All four units were notified. Only the tenants in the units 1 and 2 filed written responses and appeared at the hearing.

Square Footage of the Building

The Alameda County Assessor's Office shows the parcel number and the square footage of 3,582. The owner submitted Grant Deed recorded on 2/28/2014 showing Nand, LLC and Cesely Smith as the grantees of the subject property. (These documents were submitted by the owner on 6/23/15; the entire package consisted of 73 pages and admitted in evidence.)

Construction Expenses

After the current owner purchased the subject property, she began construction and remodeling project. The work included foundation, plumbing, heating, re-roofing, painting, replacement of windows, replacement of the back staircase and a new deck. All four units have new kitchen cabinets, countertops, and sinks. Two units have remodeled bathrooms.

The owner submitted payments made to various contractors for the construction costs broken down as follows:

<u>Foundation</u>. The work included demolition of the old foundation, framing and pouring of the new foundation, support of the building and seismic retrofitting; the payments included labor, material, engineering plans fee and building permit fees. The owner submitted a copy of the Agreement between Owner and Contractor Armando Sanchez Construction Inc., and copies of the checks, payable to Sanchez Construction as follows:

The payments made to Armando Sanchez total \$66,650.

<u>Heating</u>. The work, done by Lacayo Plumbing and Heating, included new heating system, removing existing heaters and installation of efficient furnaces in the crawl space.

- Check #76702522 for \$1,960.00

- Check #761702566 for \$6,000.00
- Check #921500844 for \$5,000.00
- Check #112 for \$8,200.00 The payments made to Lacayo totaled \$21,160.00.

Re-roofing. The work included tearing off and installing a new plywood decking and new roofing system. The owner submitted a copy of the invoice stamped as Paid showing zero balance and payment made in the amount of \$26,250.00 to Lovett & Lovett Roofing Co. Inc. Copies of three on-line banking receipts of payments were submitted in the amounts of \$15,950.00, \$8,000.00, and \$2,300.00.

General remodeling. The work included interior remodeling of kitchens, including cabinets, sinks, appliances, counters, plumbing, replacement of windows and back staircase, building a deck, new electrical to allow installation of additional fixtures for common areas and outside lighting. The project description, the contractor Yazolino Brothers Construction, scope of work and project estimate and schedule of payments were submitted together with copies of progress payments made as follows:

- -Check #850600108 for \$1,000.00
- Check #111 for \$30,000.00
- Check #113 for \$30,000.00
- Check #115 for \$30,000.00
- Check #116 for \$20,000.00
- Check #118 for \$40,000.00
- Check #122 for \$14,000.00

- Check #123 for \$12,500.00
- Check #129 for \$10,000.00

The payments made to Yazolino Brothers totaled \$192,273.00.

<u>Sewer lateral</u>: The owner submitted copies of two payments payable to Armando Sanchez for the replacement of sewer lateral (check #921500843 for \$10,365.14) and a sidewalk repair connected to the sewer lateral replacement (check #110 for \$3,250.00). The payments total \$13,615.14.

The total amount paid for the entire rehabilitation project is \$319,948.14. There was no evidence presented that the work was not done, the owner did not pay for the construction project or received any type of reimbursement. There was no evidence presented that any of the work was deferred maintenance or cosmetic upgrade.

FINDINGS OF FACT AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Substantial Rehabilitation

O.M.C. 8.22.030(A)(6) states that dwelling units located in "substantially rehabilitated buildings" are not "covered units" under the Rent Adjustment Ordinance.

- a. In order to obtain an exemption based on substantial rehabilitation, an owner must have spent a minimum of fifty (50) percent of the average basic cost for new construction for a rehabilitation project.
- b. The average basic cost for new construction shall be determined using tables issued by the chief building inspector applicable for the time period when the substantial rehabilitation was completed.¹

The most recent table issued on May 1, 2015, by the Building Services agency, attached as Table "A," refers to a dollar amount per square foot. Therefore, in order to make the necessary mathematical computation, an owner must present sufficient evidence of the square footage of the building, as well as the cost of the rehabilitation project. While the construction occurred prior to May 1, 2015 (in 2014 and completed in early 2015), this Table will be used for calculation because it is closer to time of construction than the former Table that was used, which was dated August 1, 2009, and assessed \$127.00 per square foot.

Calculation

The attached Table "A" states that as of May 1, 2015, the average cost of new construction of apartment buildings of more than 2 units, type V – wood frame construction, is \$145.07 per square foot.

To determine if the owner is entitled to the exemption the following calculation is necessary: multiply the square footage (3,582) by \$145.07 and divide that by 2. Therefore, if the owner spent at least \$259,829.37 on the construction project, the building is exempt from the Rent Ordinance.

The owner provided proof of payments that she spent at least \$319,948.14. Therefore, the building has been "substantially rehabilitated." The rental units in the building are exempt from the Rent Ordinance.

<u>ORDER</u>

- 1. The petition L15-0016 is granted.
- 2. The subject property is a "substantially rehabilitated" building.
- 3. A certificate of exemption for the subject building will be issued when this Decision becomes final.

- 4. The owner must continue to pay the Rent Adjustment Service Fee as the units are not exempt from Oakland's Just Cause for Eviction Ordinance (See O.M.C. §8.22.500).
- 5. Right to Appeal: This decision is the final decision of the Rent Adjustment Program Staff. Either party may appeal this decision by filing a properly completed appeal using the form provided by the Rent Adjustment Program. The appeal must be received within twenty (20) days after service of the decision. The date of service is shown on the attached Proof of Service. If the Rent Adjustment Office is closed on the last day to file, the appeal may be filed on the next business day.

Revisions to Proposed Tenant Protection Ordinance Regulations

At the July 13 meeting, the Board considered Tenant Protection Ordinance Regulations ("Regulations") brought forward by staff. During the Board's discussion of the proposed amendments to the Regulations, the Board advised that it would like to clarify the definitions in the Regulations. We also have received comments from the East Bay Rental Housing Association (EBRHA) and the Jobs and Housing Coalition (JHC).

This supplemental report identifies the revisions to the definition of "bad faith" in the Regulations that we made in response to the Board's discussion and comments from stakeholders. Specifically, we revised the definition of "bad faith" to more closely align with a

¹ Stakeholders and the Board also raised questions about notice to the landlord of issues in tenants' units. Oakland Municipal Code § 8.22.650(B) requires notice as a prerequisite to a private lawsuit:

Before a Tenant may file a civil suit alleging a violation of 8.22.640.A.1., 2., 3., 10., 11., 12, or 13., the affected Tenant must first notify the Owner or his or her designated agent regarding the problem. If the allegation is a violation of 8.22.640.A.1., 2., 3.,11., or 12, the Tenant must allow 15 days for the Owner to correct the problem, unless the Owner notifies the Tenant that the repairs will take more than 15 days and provides for a reasonable time period for completion. If the repair takes more than 15 days, the Tenant may file the civil suit if the Owner does not take reasonable steps to commence addressing the problem or the Owner does not follow through to complete the repairs with reasonable diligence.

"gross negligence" standard² to read as follows:

Bad Faith for purposes of the TPO refers to willful, reckless, or grossly negligent conduct in disregard for legal requirements or in a manner indifferent to the rights of or impact on Tenants. The scope and effect of the conduct will be taken into account in determining whether it is in Bad Faith.

Under Oakland Municipal Code Section 8.22.670, enhanced penalties in the form of treble damages³ are available for mental or emotional distress inflicted in "knowing violation or in reckless disregard of the TPO." This heightened standard means that regulations enacting a baseline standard of care at or above the level of recklessness would be inconsistent with the statutory scheme of the TPO. Accordingly, staff has provided a more inclusive definition.

We ask that the Rent Board consider and adopt these proposed regulations as revised in Exhibit A.

² The second clause, "conduct in a manner indifferent to the rights of or impact on tenants", is also a gross negligence standard. See Cal. Code Regs., tit. 22, § 71811 ("Gross negligence means the failure of a person to exercise any care, or the exercise of so little care that it is apparent that the person is indifferent to the consequences of his or her conduct and to the welfare of others.").

³ In adjudicating TPO actions, a court "may not award both punitive damages and treble damages." (O.M.C. § 8.22.670(B)(2).) Given the City's limited capacity to bring TPO cases, effective enforcement of the Ordinance largely depends on tenant initiative. However, in landlord-tenant actions, violations "are likely to involve small amounts of money that may not justify the costs of litigation—especially in the case of suits brought by the very type of tenant this ordinance is especially intended to protect ... If civil remedies are to be meaningful, they must provide sufficient financial incentive to justify bringing the suit. The award of treble damages very clearly serves such a purpose." (*Kelly v. Yee* (1989) 213 Cal.App.3d 336, 341 (recognizing the necessity of treble damages to enforcement of San Francisco's Rent Stabilization Ordinance).)

Exhibit A

REGULATIONS FOR THE TENANT PROTECTION ORDINANCE (CODIFIED IN THE OAKLAND MUNICIPAL CODE at 8.22.600, et seq.)

Introduction.

The following regulations address portions of the Tenant Protection Ordinance ("TPO"). The following regulations comprise the entire set of regulations the Housing, Residential Rent and Relocation Board ("Rent Board") adopted for the TPO. The numbering system follows the codified version of the Tenant Protection Ordinance.

8.22.640 - Tenant Harassment

8.22.640A.

Bad Faith for purposes of the TPO refers to willful, reckless, or grossly negligent conduct in disregard for legal requirements or in a manner indifferent to the rights of or impact on Tenants. The scope and effect of the conduct will be taken into account in determining whether it is in Bad Faith.

8.22.670 - Civil Remedies

8.22.670A.2.

A pattern and practice for purposes of this Section refers to more than one violation of O.M.C. 8.22.640 against the same Tenant or one violation of O.M.C. 8.22.640 against more than one Tenant.

WHEREAS, in November 2015, the Oakland City Council enacted the Tenant Protection Ordinance ("TPO") (O.M.C. 8.22.600, et seq.);

WHEREAS, the purpose of the TPO is to deter property owners from engaging in certain, enumerated behaviors that the Ordinance characterizes as harassment and to provide penalties for violations;

WHEREAS, the TPO authorizes the City Attorney to bring civil actions against property owners the City Attorney believes are violating the ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the City Attorney brought litigation against property owners for TPO violations; and

WHEREAS, in TPO litigation, some property owners defended using definitions of the "bad faith" requirement for determining a TPO violation that differed from the City's concept of bad faith; and

WHEREAS, in TPO litigation, some property owners contested the City's definition of the "pattern and practice" threshold for the City Attorney to bring a TPO action against a property owner; and

WHEREAS, clarifying the concepts of bad faith and pattern and practice through TPO regulations would benefit property owners in complying with the TPO, tenants in recognizing violations, and the City Attorney to clarify when that office can bring TPO litigation; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That the Housing, Residential Rent and Relocation Board enacts the regulations to clarify the terms "bad faith" and "pattern and practice" in the TPO as set out in Exhibit A; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the TPO regulations herein enacted shall take effect immediately upon passage of the resolution.

Attachment A – Tenant Protection Ordinance

Article V. - Tenant Protection Ordinance

8.22.600 - Tenant protection ordinance.

This ordinance shall be known as the "Tenant Protection Ordinance" ("TPO").

(Ord. No. 13265, § 1, 11-5-2014)

8.22.610 - Findings and purpose.

- A. There is a very significant demand for rental housing in Oakland leading to rising rents, caused in part by the spillover of increasingly expensive housing costs in San Francisco.
- B. Rents in Oakland increased twelve percent (12%) in 2012 and 15% in 2013 (Source: East Bay Express, February 12-18, 2014, "The Rise of the New Land Lords," sourcing Oakland Department of Housing and Community Development). As noted by a February 8, 2014 Oakland Tribune article ("High prices sending Bay Area renters and homebuyers to outlying communities"), "Squeezed by astronomical home prices and rents that are almost as unaffordable, a growing number of Bay Area residents are pulling up stakes and trading long commutes for cheaper housing."
- C. According to Oakland Department of Housing and Community Development citing to Zillow Real Estate Research, the estimated rent for all homes in Oakland for June 2014 two thousand one hundred twenty-four dollars (\$2,124.00) is nearly eleven percent (11%) higher than that for the same month last year (\$1,918.00), and rents have risen every month except for one (1) since January 2013 (18 months total). If current patterns persist, the estimated rent for all homes in June 2015 will be two thousand three hundred eighty-six dollars (\$2,386.00). By comparison, the estimated median rent for all Oakland homes for June 2012 was \$1,818.00, a thirty-one percent (31%) increase in only thirty-six (36) months.
- D. On September 12, 2014, the San Francisco Examiner reported that "San Francisco and Oakland have the distinction of having some of the highest rental rate increases in the nation for the month of August," with Oakland's rents increasing fourteen and four-tenths percent (14.4%) since last year, according to data collected by Trulia.
- E. The rising market demand for rental housing in Oakland creates an incentive for some landlords to engage in harassing behavior or fail to make repairs to pressure existing tenants in rent controlled units to move so that rents can be raised. Existing remedies, such as petitioning the Rent Adjustment Program to restore a rental rate or order repairs, or employing an attorney at great cost to file a lawsuit to enforce state law of lease provisions, are insufficient deterrents to engaging in the illegal conduct in the first place.
- F. The imbalance between supply and demand creates an imbalance of bargaining power between landlords and tenants, which has resulted in many tenants, especially those not in rent controlled units, being unwilling or unable to assert their legal rights, which is detrimental to the health, safety and general welfare of Oakland because the stability, security and quality of housing opportunities are reduced.
- G. The Rent Adjustment Program office of the City of Oakland has conservatively estimated receiving one hundred (100) to two hundred (200) complaints each month from tenants claiming landlord harassment, many of which are completely outside the jurisdiction of the Rent Adjustment Program.
- H. Numerous press articles have reported on the rise of tenant harassment throughout the Bay Area.
- Data from organizations providing services to low-income renters in Oakland, including East Bay Community Law Center and Centro Legal de la Raza, indicate that some of their clients live in housing with habitability problems and experience landlord harassment.

- J. Of the approximately four hundred eighty (480) Oakland tenants who received legal services at Centro Legal de la Raza during fiscal year 2014 (July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2014), approximately forty percent (40%) faced harassment by their landlords. The forms of harassment varied, but included one or more of the following in each case:
 - 1. Interrupting, terminating, failing to provide or threatening to interrupt, terminate or fail to provide housing services required by contract or by State, County or municipal housing, health or safety laws;
 - 2. Failing to perform required repairs and/or maintenance or threatening to fail to do so;
 - Failing to exercise due diligence In completing repairs and maintenance once undertaken or failing to follow appropriate industry repair, containment or remediation protocols designed to minimize exposure to noise, dust, lead paint, mold, asbestos, or other building materials with potentially harmful health impacts;
 - 4. Abusing the owner's right of access into a rental housing unit as that right is provided by law;
 - 5. Unlawfully removing from the rental unit personal property, furnishings, or any other items without the prior written consent of the tenant;
 - 6. Influencing, or attempting to influence, a tenant to vacate a rental unit through fraud, intimidation or coeroion;
 - 7. Attempting to coerce a tenant to vacate with offer(s) of payments to vacate which ate accompanied with threats or intimidation;
 - 8. Threatening the tenant, by word or gesture, with physical harm;
 - 9. Substantially and directly interfering with a Tenant's right to quiet use and enjoyment of a rental housing unit as that right is defined by California law;
 - 10. Fraudulently refusing to accept or acknowledge receipt of a Tenant's lawful rent payment.
- K. A majority of Oakland residents are renters. The rental housing units in the City of Oakland include many subject to rent stabilization and some that are not. The cities of San Francisco, Santa Monica, West Hollywood, and East Palo Alto have each passed ordinances prohibiting various forms of harassment by landlords and their agents against tenants.
- L. The City Council of Oakland recognizes that displacement of tenants is a major concern and is interested in putting forth policies that help to maintain the ability of people in all income categories to live in our city. The increased housing pressures for residents across a range of lower and middle income levels warrants improved rent stabilization and tenant protection policies. The City Council finds that reasonable regulation of aspects of the landlord-tenant relationship is necessary in order to foster constructive communication, maintain an adequate supply of a variety of rental housing options, and protect health, safety, and the general welfare of the public.
- M. The purpose of this policy is to deter harassing behavior by landlords, to encourage landlords to follow the law and uphold their responsibility to provide habitable rental properties, and to give tenants legal recourse in instances where they are subjected to harassing behavior by landlords.

8.22.620 - Definitions.

"Health Facility" has the same meaning as in the Just Cause for Eviction Ordinance (O.M.C. 8.22.340).

"Owner" has the same meaning as in the Just Cause for Eviction Ordinance (O.M.C. 8.22.340).

"Owner of Record" has the same meaning as in the Just Cause for Eviction Ordinance (O.M.C. 8.22.340).

"Rent" has the same meaning as in the Just Cause for Eviction Ordinance (O.M.C. 8.22.340).

"Rent Board" has the same meaning as in the Just Cause for Eviction Ordinance (O.M.C. 8.22,340).

"Rental Agreement" has the same meaning as in the Just Cause for Eviction Ordinance (O.M.C. 8.22.340).

"Rental Unit" has the same meaning as in the Just Cause for Eviction Ordinance (O.M.C. 8.22.340).

"Tenant" has the same meaning as in the Just Cause for Eviction Ordinance (O.M.C. 8.22.340).

"Skilled Nursing Facility" has the same meaning as in the Just Cause for Eviction Ordinance (O.M.C. 8.22.340).

8.22.630 - Applicability and exemptions.

A. The TPO shall apply to all Rental Units where there is a Rental Agreement between an Owner and one or more Tenants, unless exempted herein. The application of the TPO includes units that may not be covered under the Rent Adjustment Ordinance (O.M.C. 8.22.100, et seq.) or the Just Cause for Eviction Ordinance (O.M.C. 8.22.300, et seq.)

B. Exemptions.

- 1. Exemption for nonprofit owned rental housing. Any Rental Unit owned by (a) a corporation or organization exempt pursuant to United States Internal Revenue Code §501(c)(3) or any successor legislation exempting charitable organizations from federal income tax, (b) a limited partnership where the managing general partner is a corporation or organization exempt pursuant to United States Internal Revenue Code §501(c)(3) or any successor legislation exempting charitable organizations from federal income tax, or (c) a limited partnership where the managing general partner is a limited liability company whose sole members are corporations or organizations exempt pursuant to United States Internal Revenue Code §501(c)(3) or any successor legislation exempting charitable organizations from federal income tax shall have an exemption from the TPO's civil enforcement pursuant to this article.
- 2. Rental Units in any Hospital, Skilled Nursing Facility, or Health Facility.
- 3. Rental Units in a nonprofit facility that has the primary purpose of providing short term treatment, assistance, or therapy for alcohol, drug, or other substance abuse and the housing is provided incident to the recovery program, and where the client has been informed in writing of the temporary or transitional nature of the housing at its inception and is licensed for such purpose where such license is required.
- 4. Rental Units in a nonprofit facility which provides a structured living environment that has the primary purpose of helping homeless persons obtain the skills necessary for independent living in permanent housing and where occupancy is restricted to a limited and specific period of time of not more than twenty-four (24) months and where the client has been informed in writing of the temporary or transitional nature of the housing at its inception and is licensed for such purpose where such license is required.
- 5. Rental Units exempted from Part 4, Title 4, Chapter 2 of the California Civil Code (CCC) by CCC § 1940(b) (transient occupancy in hotels/motels).
- 6. A rental unit in a residential property that is divided into a maximum of three (3) units, one of which is occupied by the owner of record as his or her principal residence for a period of no less than twelve (12) months. For purposes of this section, the term owner of record shall not include any person who claims a homeowner's property tax exemption on any other real property in the State of California.

7. A rental unit in a newly constructed residential property that has a certificate of occupancy issued after the effective date of O.M.C. 8.22.600, et seq. For the purposes of this exemption, "newly constructed" means all units on the parcel were built from the ground up under the same certificate of occupancy and not converted from property previously used for non-residential purposes. In the event the property is not issued a certificate of occupancy, then the exemption starts on the date that the last building related permit is finalized, if after the effective date of O.M.C. 8.22.600, et seq. This exemption is a limited duration exemption and expires fifteen (15) years from the date the exemption commences.

8.22.640 - Tenant harassment.

- A. No Owner or such Owner's agent, contractor, subcontractor, or employee, shall do any of the following, in bad faith.
 - 1. Interrupt, terminate, or fail to provide housing services required by contract or by State, County or municipal housing, health or safety laws, or threaten to do so;
 - 2. Fail to perform repairs and maintenance required by contract or by State, County or municipal housing, health or safety laws, or threaten to do so;
 - 3. Fail to exercise due diligence in completing repairs and maintenance once undertaken or fail to follow appropriate industry repair, containment or remediation protocols designed to minimize exposure to noise, dust, lead paint, mold, asbestos, or other building materials with potentially harmful health impacts;
 - 4. Abuse the Owner's right of access into a rental housing unit as that right is provided by law;
 - 5. Remove from the Rental Unit personal property, furnishings, or any other items without the prior written consent of the Tenant, except when done pursuant to the procedure set forth in Civil Code section 1980, et seq. (disposition of Tenant's property after termination of tenancy).
 - 6. Influence or attempt to influence a Tenant to vacate a Rental Unit through fraud, intimidation or coercion, which shall include threatening to report a Tenant to U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, though that prohibition shall not be construed as preventing communication with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement regarding an alleged violation:
 - 7. Offer payments to a Tenant to vacate more than once in six (6) months, after the Tenant has notified the Owner in writing the Tenant does not desire to receive further offers of payments to vacate;
 - 8. Attempt to coerce a Tenant to vacate with offer(s) of payments to vacate which are accompanied with threats or intimidation. This shall not include settlement offers made in good faith and not accompanied with threats or intimidation in pending eviction actions:
 - 9. Threaten the tenant, by word or gesture, with physical harm;
 - 10. Substantially and directly interfere with a Tenant's right to quiet use and enjoyment of a rental housing unit as that right is defined by California law;
 - 11. Refuse to accept or acknowledge receipt of a Tenant's lawful rent payment, except as such refusal may be permitted by state law after a notice to quit has been served on the Tenant and the time period for performance pursuant to the notice has expired;
 - 12. Refuse to cash a rent check for over thirty (30) days unless a written receipt for payment has been provided to the Tenant, except as such refusal may be permitted by state law after a notice to quit has been served on the Tenant and the time period for performance pursuant to the notice has exptred;
 - 13. Interfere with a Tenant's right to privacy;

- 14. Request information that violates a Tenant's right to privacy, including but not limited to residence or citizenship status or social security number, except as required by law or, in the case of a social security number, for the purpose of obtaining information for the qualifications for a tenancy, or not release such information except as required or authorized by law;
- 15. Other repeated acts or omissions of such significance as to substantially interfere with or disturb the comfort, repose, peace or quiet of any person lawfully entitled to occupancy of such dwelling unit and that cause, are likely to cause, or are intended to cause any person lawfully entitled to occupancy of a dwelling unit to vacate such dwelling unit or to surrender or waive any rights in relation to such occupancy;
- 16. Removing a housing service for the purpose of causing the Tenant to vacate the Rental Unit. For example, taking away a parking space knowing that a Tenant cannot find alternative parking and must move.
- B. Retaliation Prohibited. Retaliation against a Tenant because of the Tenant's exercise of rights under the TPO is prohibited. Retaliation claims may only be brought in court and may not be addressed administratively. A court may consider the protections afforded by the TPO in evaluating a claim of retaliation.
- C. Evictions. Nothing in the TPO shall be construed as to prevent an Owner from lawfully evicting a Tenant pursuant to state law or Oakland's Just Cause for Eviction Ordinance. (O.M.C. 8.22.300, et seq.).
- D. Rent Adjustments. Nothing in the TPO shall be construed as to prevent an Owner from lawfully increasing a Tenant's rent pursuant to state law or Oakland's Rent Adjustment Ordinance (O.M.C. 8.22.100, et seq.), and such increases shall not be deemed violations of Section 8.22.640 of the TPO.
- E. Notice to Tenants.
 - 1. Commencement.
 - a. For Rental Units covered by the Rent Adjustment Ordinance the Notice at Commencement of Tenancy required by O.M.C. 8.22.06 shall include a reference to the TPO.
 - b. For all Rental Units that are not covered by the Rent Adjustment Ordinance, Owners are required to provide a notice regarding the TPO to all Tenants using the required form prescribed by the City staff.
 - 2. Common area. If Rental Units subject to this ordinance are located in a building with an interior common area that all of the building's Tenants have access to, the Owner must post a notice in at least one (1) such common area in the building via a form prescribed by the City staff.
- F. Repairs and maintenance. Nothing in the TPO shall be construed as requiring different timelines or standards for repairs or maintenance, as required by contract or State, County or municipal housing, health, and safety laws, or according to appropriate industry protocols.

8.22.650 - General remedies.

- A. Violations of the TPO. Violations of section 8.22.640 may be enforced by civil remedies as set forth in this section or as otherwise specifically set out in this O.M.C article.
- B. Notice requirement for Tenants. Before a Tenant may file an a civil suit alleging a violation of subsection 8.22.640.A.1., 2., 3., 10., 11., 12, or 13., the affected Tenant must first notify the Owner or his or her designated agent regarding the problem. If the allegation is a violation of subsections 8.22.640.A.1., 2., 3.,11., or 12, the Tenant must allow fifteen (15) days for the Owner to correct the problem, unless the Owner notifies the Tenant that the repairs will take more than fifteen (15) days and provides for a reasonable time period for completion. If the repair takes more than fifteen (15)

days, the Tenant may file the civil suit if the Owner does not take reasonable steps to commence addressing the problem or the Owner does not follow through to complete the repairs with reasonable diligence.

- C. In addition to the remedies provided in the TPO, a violator is liable for such costs, expenses, and disbursements paid or incurred by the City in abatement and prosecution of the violation.
- D. The remedies available in the TPO are not exclusive and may be used cumulatively with any other remedies in this chapter or at law.

8.22.660 - Reserved.

8.22.670 - Civil remedies.

A. General Civil Remedies.

- 1. Enforcement by Aggrieved-Tenant. An aggrieved Tenant may bring a civil action for injunctive relief or damages, or both, for any violation of 8.22.540.
- 2. Enforcement by City Attorney. The City Attorney may enforce the TPO through civil action for injunctive relief or damages, or both, for when the party against whom enforcement is sought has a pattern and practice of violating the TPO. The City Attorney may also request that an administrative citation or civil penalty be issued by the City. The City Attorney has the sole discretion to determine the cases appropriate for enforcement by the City Attorney's Office.
- B. Treble and Exemplary Damages.
 - 1. Any person who violates, aids, or incites another person to violate subsection 8.22.640.A or E. is liable in a court action for each and every such offense for money damages of not less than three times actual damages suffered by an aggrieved Tenant (including damages for mental or emotional distress), or for minimum damages in the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00), whichever is greater, and whatever other relief the court deems appropriate. In the case of an award of damages for mental or emotional distress, said award shall only be trebled if the trier of fact finds that the Owner acted in knowing violation of or in reckless disregard of the TPO.
 - A court may award punitive damages in a proper case as set out in Civil Code Section 3294 and pursuant to the standards set forth in that Code Section or any successor thereto, but may not award both punitive damages and treble damages.
- C. Injunctive Relief. Any person who commits an act, proposes to commit an act, or engages in any pattern and practice which violates the TPO may be enjoined therefrom by any court of competent jurisdiction. An action for injunction under this subsection may be brought by any aggrieved Tenant, by the City Attorney (for a pattern and practice only), or by an aggrieved Tenant who will fairly and adequately represent the interest of the protected class.

D. Attorney's Fees and Costs

- 1. Action by City Attorney. In any administrative, civil, or special proceeding brought pursuant to the TPO, the City may, at the initiation of the proceeding, seek an award of attorney's fees. If the City seeks an award of attorney's fees, the award shall be made to the prevailing party. Provided however, that no award may be made to a prevailing party that exceeds the amount of reasonable attorney's fees incurred by the City in the action or proceeding. Court costs may be awarded to a prevailing party pursuant to state law.
- Action by Tenant. In any civil action brought pursuant to the TPO, the prevailing Tenant is entitled
 to recover the Tenant's reasonable attorney's fees. A defendant Owner may recover reasonable
 attorney's fees if the complaint brought by the Tenant was devoid of merit and brought in bad
 faith. Court costs may be awarded to a prevailing party pursuant to state law.

3. Costs of Investigation. In the event the City Attorney brings an administrative, civil, or special proceeding pursuant to the TPO, the City Attorney may recover its costs of investigation.

8.22.680 - Miscellaneous.

A. Regulations and Forms. The Rent Board has the authority to make such regulations to implement this O.M.C. Chapter 8.22 Article V as are not inconsistent with the TPO, provided, however, that if the Rent Board has not issued initial regulations within such time as the City Council may proscribe, the City Administrator is authorized to make interim regulations.

Within ninety (90) days of the effective date of the TPO, the City Administrator shall develop forms to implement subsection 8.22.640.E. Any changes to the initial forms shall be effective thirty (30) days after they are made available to the public at the Rent Adjustment Program offices, unless the City Administrator makes a finding that an earlier or later date is necessary. All Forms required by the TPO are vital communication documents and shall be translated and distributed in accordance with the Equal Access to Services Ordinance, O.M.C Chapter 2.30.

B. Non-waiverability. Any provision, whether oral or written, in or pertaining to a rental agreement whereby any provision of the TPO is waived or modified, is against public policy and void.

Proposed Tenant Protection Ordinance Regulations

The City Attorney requests that the Board consider adoption of regulations designed to clarify the TPO's "bad faith" standard and the extent of the City Attorney's enforcement authority under the Ordinance. The proposed regulations are set out in the attached resolution.

On November 5, 2014, the Oakland City Council enacted the Tenant Protection Ordinance (TPO) (Attachment A). The TPO prohibits property owners from engaging in certain, enumerated behaviors that the Ordinance characterizes as harassment and provides penalties for violations. The Council's express intent in enacting the TPO was "to deter harassing behavior by landlords, to encourage landlords to follow the law and uphold their responsibility to provide habitable rental properties, and to give tenants legal recourse in instances where they are subjected to harassing behavior by landlords." O.M.C. 8.22.610M. Under O.M.C. 8.22.680A, the City Council empowered the Board to adopt regulations for the TPO without return to the Council.

Private plaintiffs and the City Attorney's Office have brought multiple enforcement actions against abusive property owners under the TPO. These actions have demonstrated the Ordinance's effectiveness in vindicating tenants' rights and punishing and deterring harassing behavior by property owners, but have also underscored the need for regulations that clearly define the City Attorney's enforcement authority. During the course of litigation to enforce the ordinance, defendant property owners contesting various matters including:

- What constitutes "bad faith" under the ordinance for purposes of determining the nature of conduct that violates the ordinance (O.M.C. 8.22.640A); and
- What constitutes a "pattern and practice" for determining when the City Attorney has standing to bring TPO litigation against a property owner (O.M.C. 8.22.670A.2)

Although the City Attorney's Office was successful in the litigation, clarifying these two definitions through regulations is important in avoiding future litigation again contesting these issues, so to further streamline litigation and make it clearer to the parties and courts as to what these concepts mean in the context of the TPO.

Bad Faith. The TPO provides: "No Owner or such Owner's agent, contractor, subcontractor, or employee, shall do any of the following, in bad faith." O.M.C. 8.22.640A. Therefore, as part of determining when a property owner is violating the TPO is showing that the property owner's conduct was in bad faith. Clarifying bad faith will assist in complying with and enforcing the TPO. The essence of the proposed regulation to define bad faith is:

Bad faith for purposes of the TPO represents conduct in disregard for legal requirements or in a manner indifferent to the rights of Tenants. Bad faith is an objective standard and can be inferred from the totality of the circumstances.

Pattern and practice. The TPO gives the City Attorney the authority to enforce it through civil litigation when there is a "pattern and practice" of TPO violations by a property owner. Because concept of pattern and practice is used in other litigation contexts with different constructions, it is important to clarify what it means in the TPO. Thus, the proposed regulation to define pattern and practice reads:

A pattern and practice for purposes of this Section refers to multiple violations of O.M.C. 8.22.640 against the same Tenant or one violation of O.M.C. 8.22.640 against multiple Tenants.

Conclusion

We ask that the Rent Board consider and adopt these proposed regulations.



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EBRHA Comments and Proposals: Proposed TPO Regulations

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Proposed TPO Regulations before the July 20, 2017 RAP meeting.

Background:

The TPO was first designed to thwart Rental owners who were attempting to evict residents through harassment. The proposed amendments appear to be changing the ordinance to a tool the City can use to harass Rental owners.

CHANGING DEFINITIONS:

The TPO proposes enforcement against owners operating in 'Bad Faith' but fails to define it. This is not a failure but a reflection of the fact that THE LAW ALREADY DEFINES BAD FAITH. The TPO does state that 'harassing behavior' is actually what they are trying to deter.

According to Black's Law Dictionary, Bad Faith is defined as: "The opposite of "good faith," generally implying or involving actual or constructive fraud, or a design to mislead or deceive another, or a neglect or refusal to fulfill some duty or some contractual obligation, not prompted by an honest mistake as to one's rights or duties, but by some interested or sinister motive." Emphasis added.

The City Attorney's redefinition removes the "intent" necessary to have Bad Faith and would characterize ANY failure to meet every standard as acting in Bad Faith. If this re-definition is allowed, a Rental Owner would be acting in bad faith if it was shown he failed to perform repairs and maintenance even if he was not notified by the tenant of the need for said repairs.

According to Black's Law Dictionary, Pattern is defined as: "A recurring characteristic that helps in the identification of any problem. It might also act as an indicator of how that problem might behave in the future."

The City Attorney's redefinition removes the element of "time" necessary to be characterized as a pattern and would change the definition so that any two violations, even if simultaneous, would be considered a pattern. Clearly that is not the true definition of a Pattern & Practice.

These proposed changes are an over-reach and would lead the City down the wrong path. In addition, the background statement provided admits that the City Attorney HAS BEEN SUCCESSFUL in litigation to enforce the ordinance, providing clear evidence that NO FURTHER REGULATIONS OR DEFINITIONS are needed. This

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argues again that the current proposals are simply 'piling on' and unnecessary regulations for political purposes only and to generate more cases for tenant attorneys.

CONCLUSION:

We respectfully request the Rent Board reject both of these one-sided, outrageous, and unfair attacks on established legal definitions and on law-abiding small owners. They must be rejected.

Instead, we propose clear, concise procedures for guaranteeing an Owner the right to first be informed by a tenant IN WRITING of any complaint or violation; the right to be proven served such notices; that the Owner be guaranteed a length of time appropriate to the type of violation and an appropriate length of time to correct it, before any City enforcement action may be started. Further, upon any enforcement action by the City, an Owner must be guaranteed the same due process to be informed officially, to allow time to correct, and a fair opportunity to comply.

These are not unique, but widely accepted rights in Code Enforcement and all other forms of City enforcement. Rental Owners must not be deprived of these same rights afforded any other citizen or business owner.
