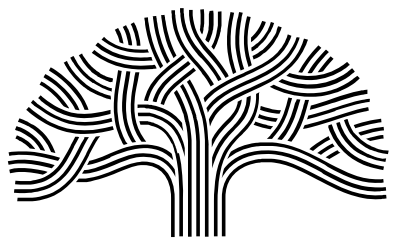

Proposal Statistics

OFCY received **333 completed proposals** across the eight funding strategies.

This is a **45% increase from 2022**, when 229 proposals were received.

The cumulative annual amount requested by all proposals was **\$62.2 million**. This is approximately a **65% increase** from 2022, when \$37.8 million was requested.

The **Youth Development** and Leadership Strategy received the most proposals **96 proposals** (29% of all proposals received).

Elementary School Expanded Learning Strategy had the second most proposals: **74 proposals** (22% of all proposals received)

Reader Recruitment and Evaluation



OFCY partnered with local universities, other city departments, community-based agencies, local elected officials and the POC to recruit readers.

A total of 253 people signed up to be readers.

175 people completed the training and scored proposals.

Reader Training

Before accessing and scoring any proposals, all readers had to:

1. Attend or review the training recording
 - Three trainings were hosted between December 13 – December 19
2. Read the Confidentiality and Impartiality Statement
3. Attest that they did not have a conflict of interest with the agency submitting the proposal
 - They did not serve on the Board for the Agency
 - They were not employed by the Agency
 - They did not participate in any programs offered by the agency

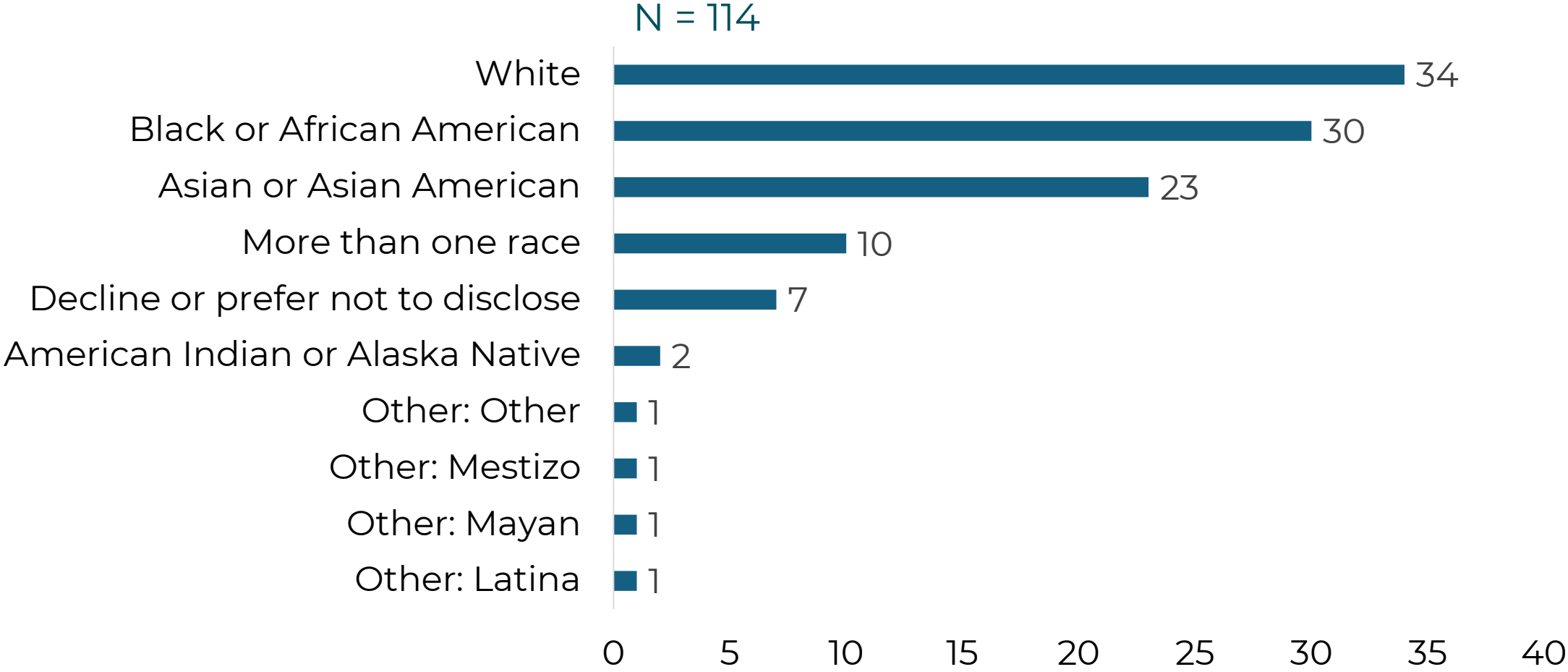
Reader Assignment

- Each proposal was assigned three readers who were responsible for reviewing and scoring the proposals.
- All readers could evaluate a minimum of three proposals and a maximum of ten proposals.
- Six reviewers were removed due to conflicts of interest
- Readers scoring period: December 19, 2025, - March 13, 2026

Reader Demographics

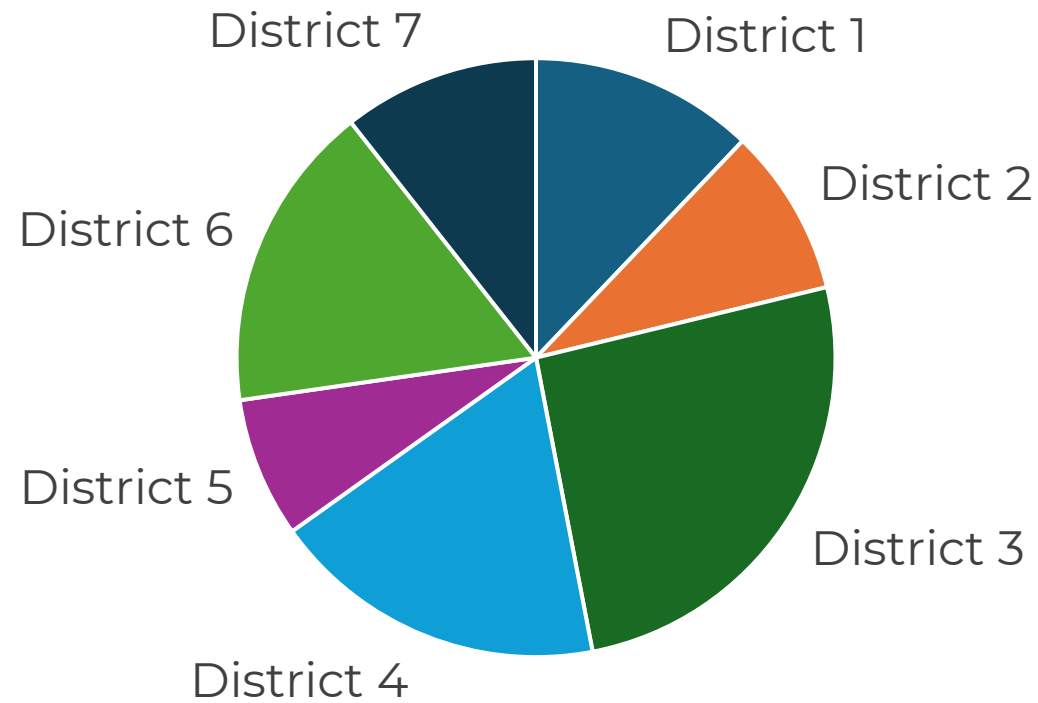
A post-scoring survey was completed by 114 readers to help OFCY collect information on populations and identities represented by the readers.

Council District Representation

66 readers (61%) are Oakland residents. Readers represented all Council Districts.



22 reader survey respondents identified as having a disability or being neurodivergent.

20 readers were under the age of 21, including 4 Oakland Youth Commissioners

21 readers were City of Oakland staff, primarily within the Human Services Department and Community and Economic Development Department.

108 year-round proposals received an average score of 90 / 100 or higher (33%)

- An additional 78 year-round proposals received an average score of 85 – 89 /100 (24%)

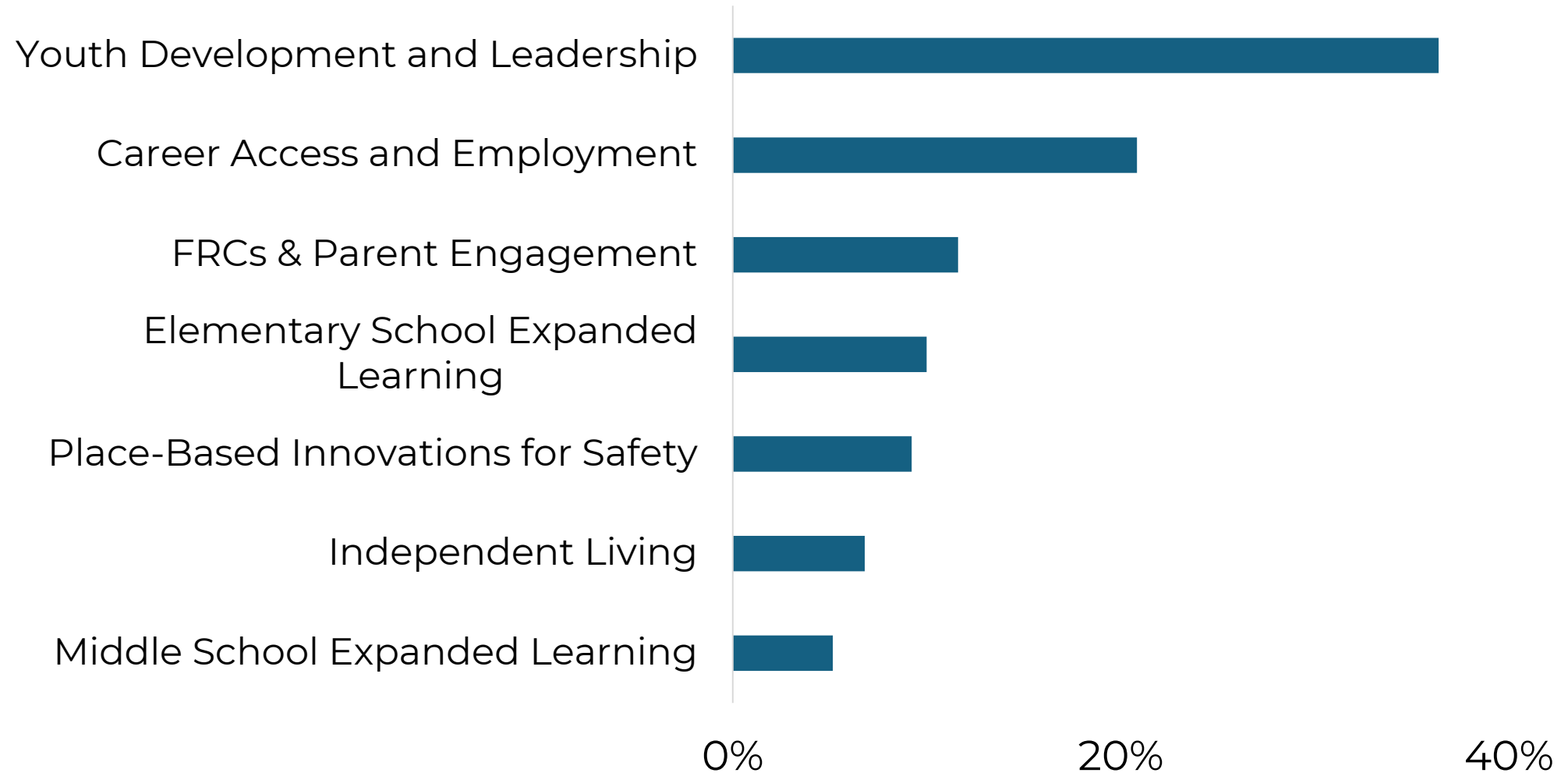

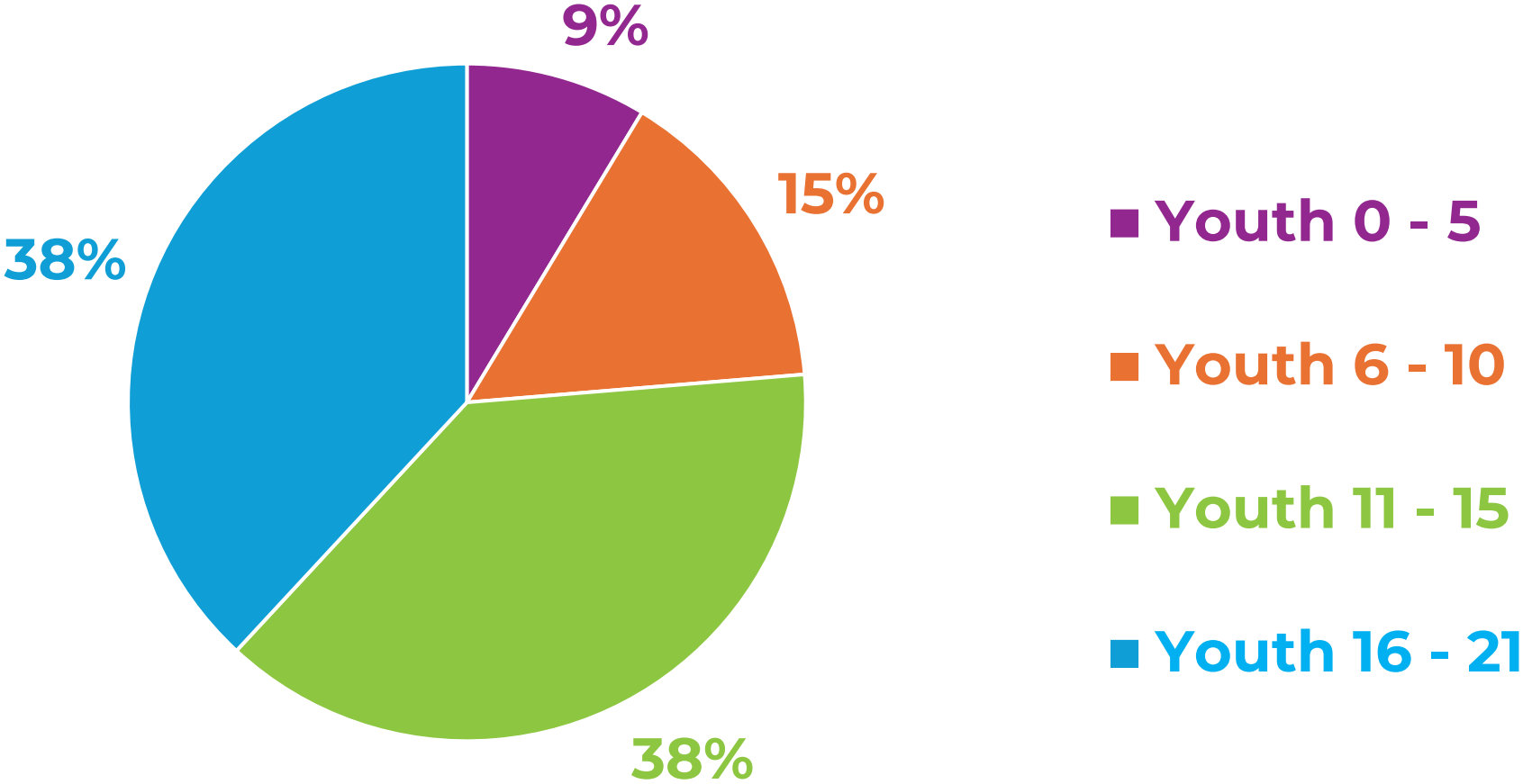

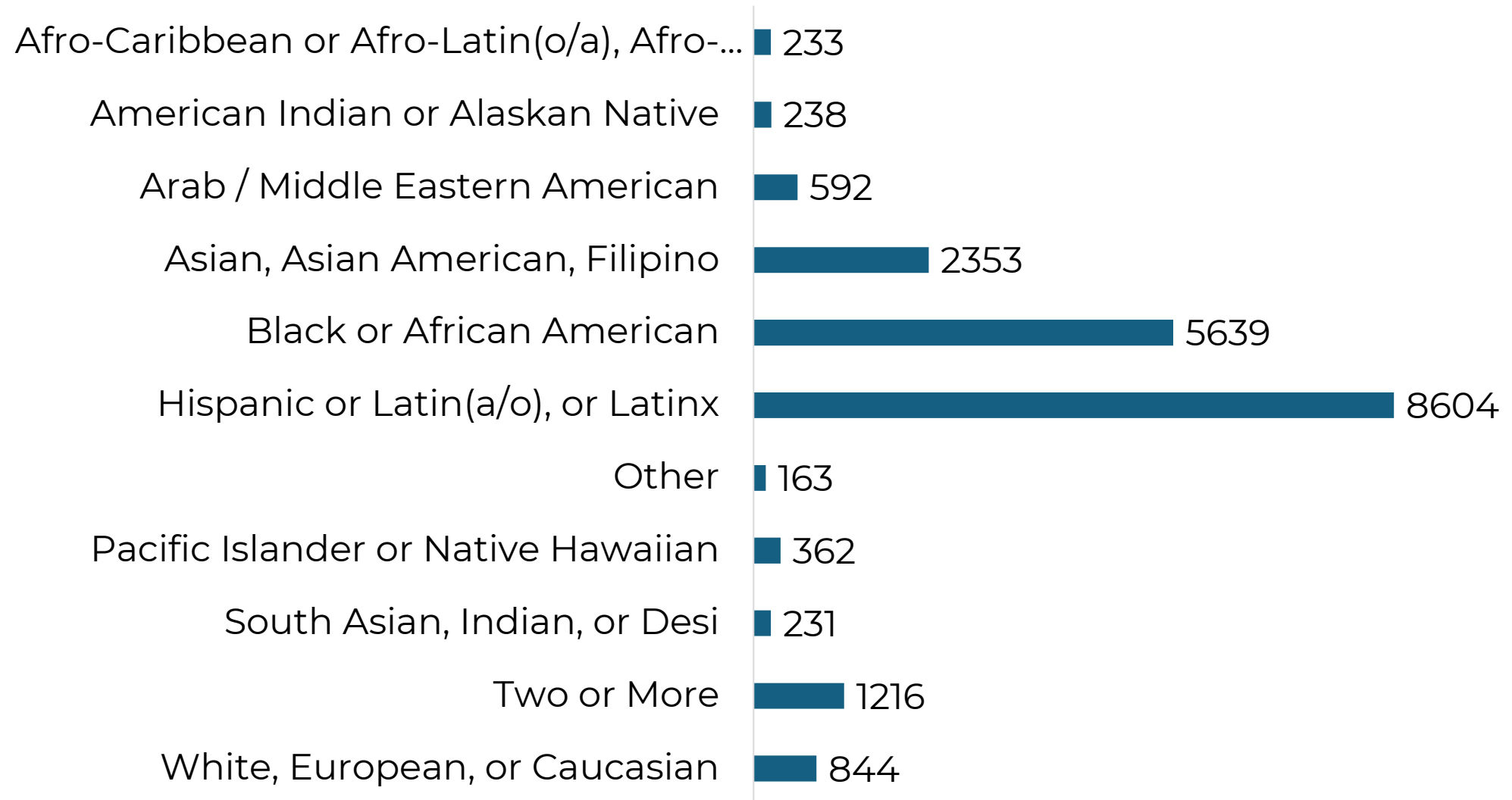

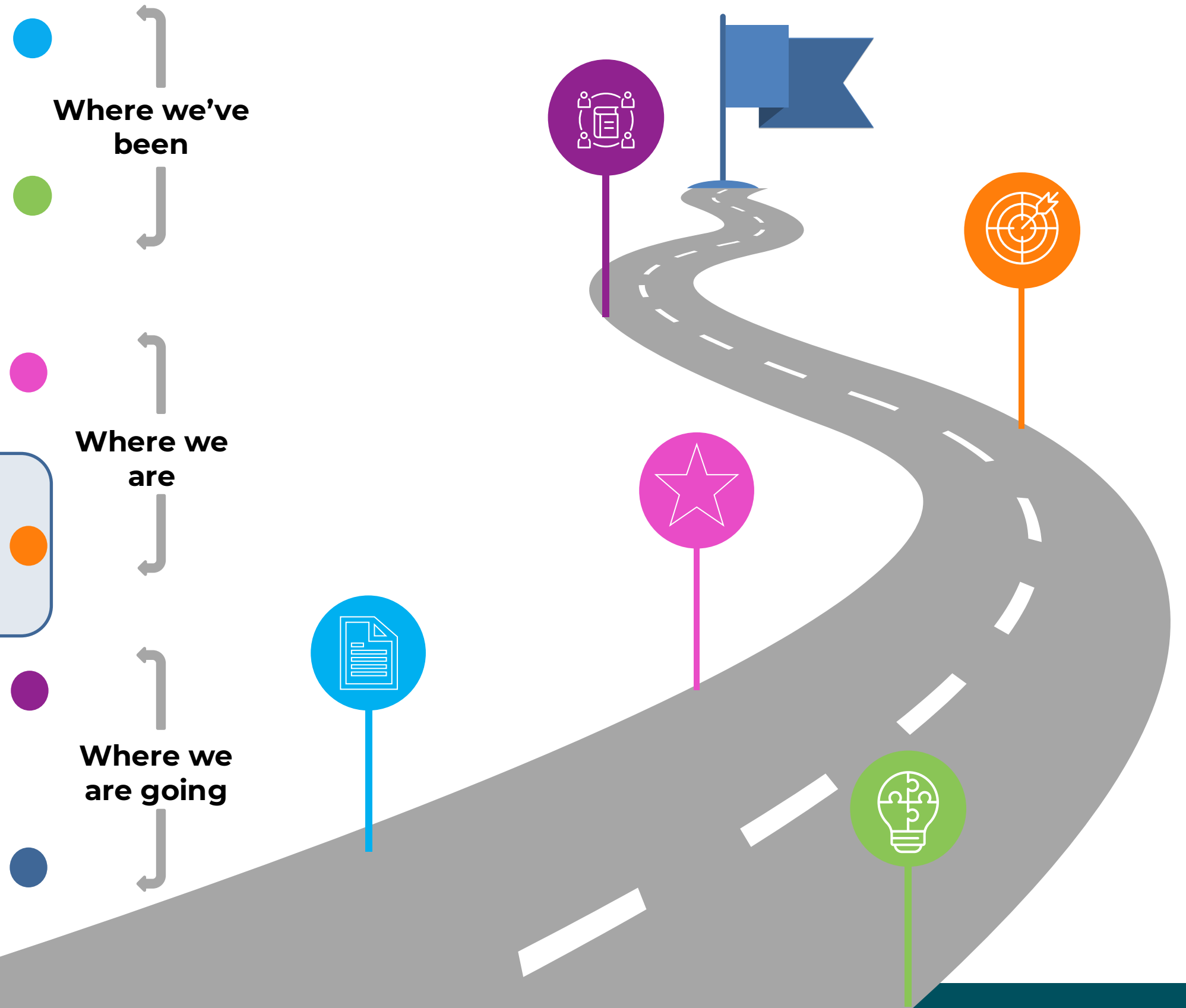

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Mayor's Summer Youth Employment Program and OFCY Summer Grant Award FY 2026 – 2028 Update

In the current 2022–2025 cycle, Summer Youth Employment funded programs **served 988 youth—79% more than planned.**

Participants earned approximately **\$1,600** for 100 hours of paid work experience.

These awards propose to serve **505 youth** annually in **Summer 2026 & Summer 2027**

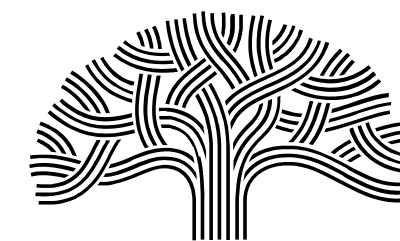

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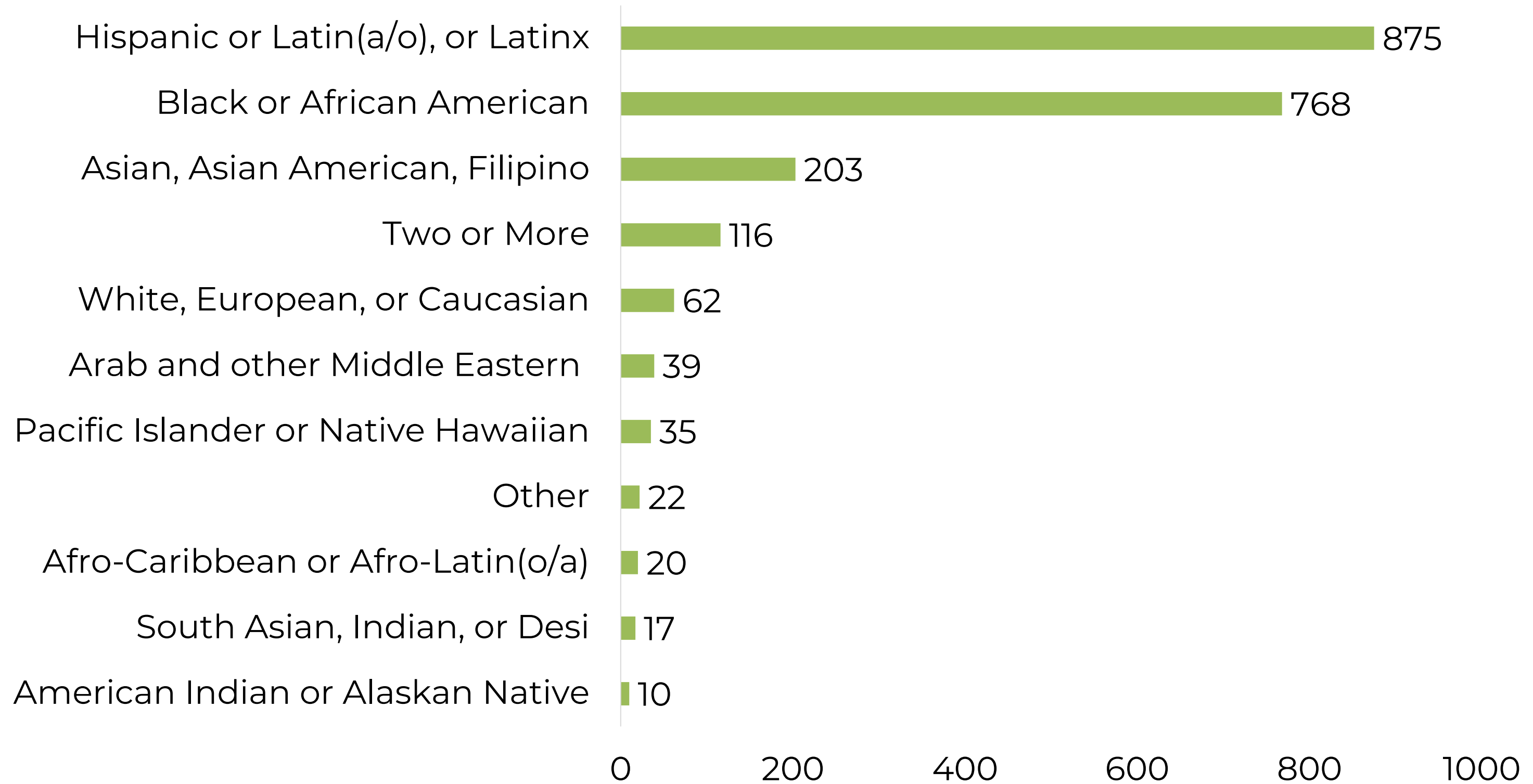
Proposed Number of Youth Served through MSYEP & OFCY Summer Programs

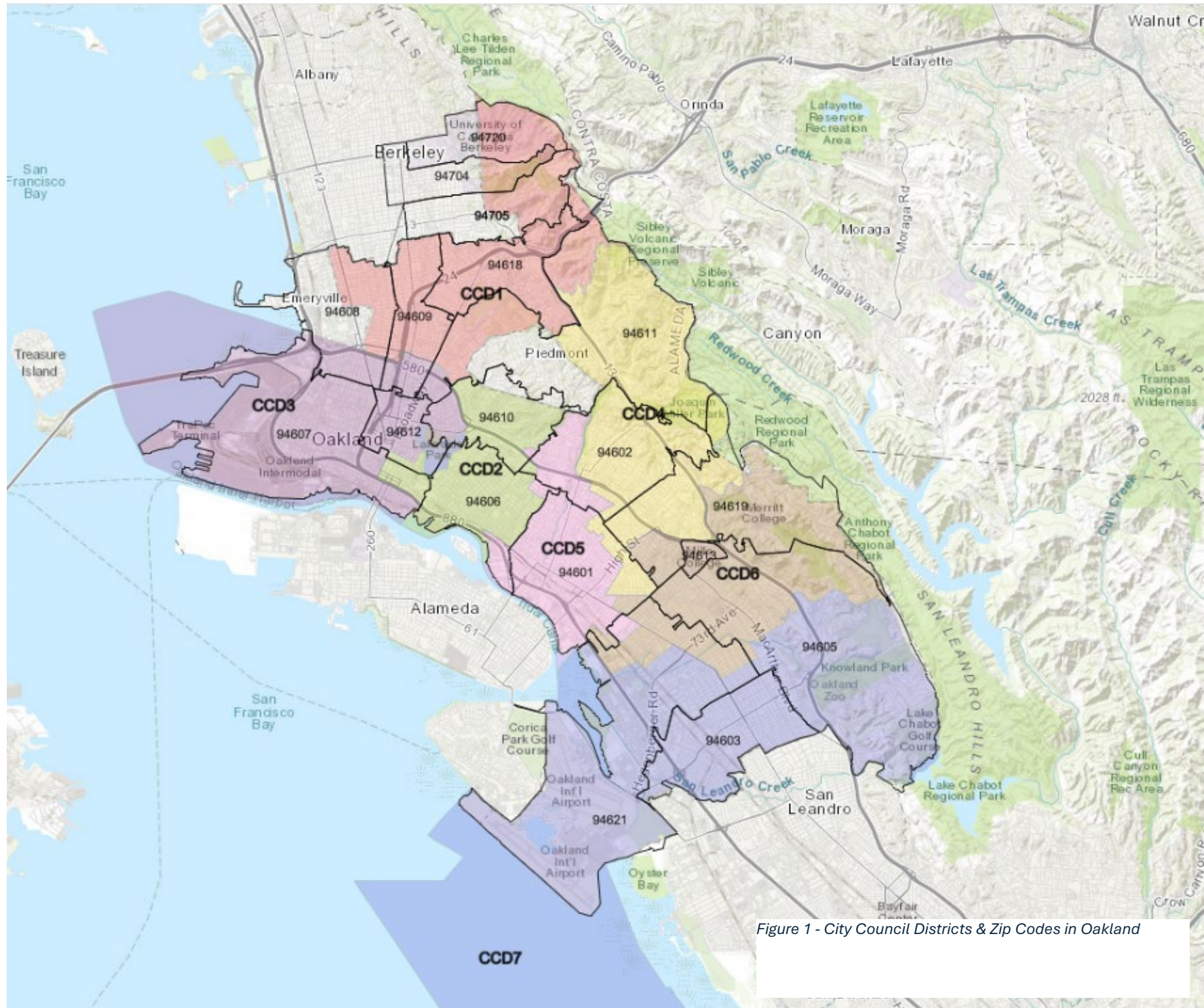

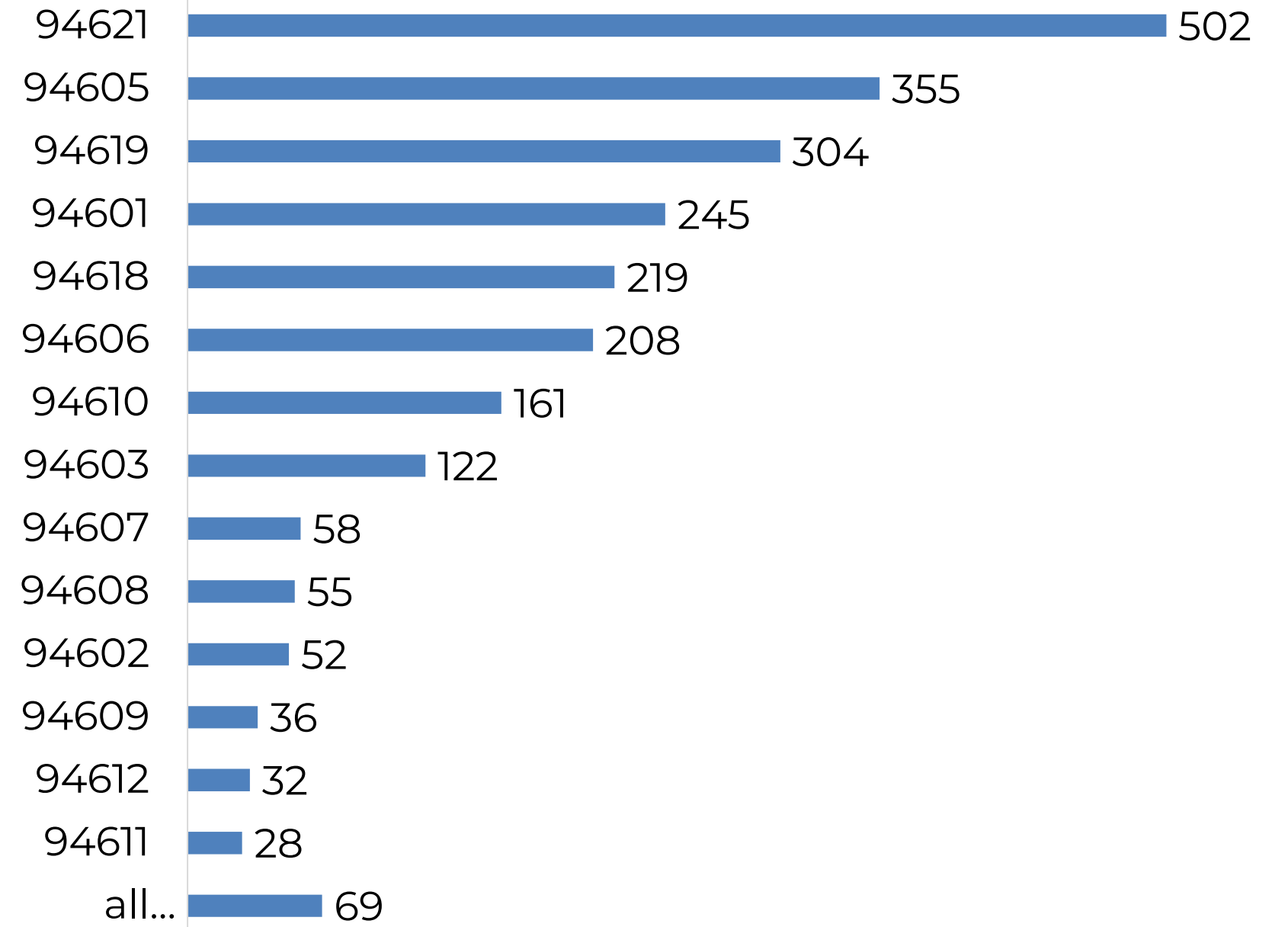
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Proposed Number of Youth Served by Ethnicity

5.6.2026 – OFCY Planning and Oversight Commission Meeting Minutes

Timestamp 6:22 PM – Items 1 & 2: Call to Order & Roll Call. Meeting called to order by Jessica Arline, acting Adult Co-Chair. Eight members of the committee are present, making quorum. Attendance is as follows:

- Jessica Arline – D1, Adult
- Ashlee Jemmott – D2, Adult, attending virtually (does not count towards quorum)
- Sophie Mehouelley – D2, Youth
- Pelayo Llamas – D4, Youth
- Olivia Sally – D4, Adult (New Representative)

- Also in attendance: Robin Love (CYS Manager), Sofia Navarro (Deputy City Administrator), Robyn Levinson (CYS Planner), and Annie Hines (OFCY Program Analyst II)

Timestamp 6:25 PM – Item 4: RLL notes the minutes will be moved to the next POC meeting.

Timestamp 6:25 PM – Item 5: Public Forum begins, with each commenter limited to two (2) minutes.

Timestamp 7:18 PM – Item 6: Staff Recommendation: Year Round Grant Awards for FY26-28. Staff provides an overview of funding recommendations, including methodology, scoring, environmental factors and funding parameters. Commissioner Hiza asks if carryforward funds are available and being considered as a part of the funding recommendations. RML notes that based on current funding allocations from the general purpose fund, carryforward will need to be used for part of these grant awards. Commissioner Arline asks how the landscape has changed in the past 10 years. RLL notes that while community needs have not generally changed, they have become more acute recently due to changes in the national landscape. Commissioner Henderson moves to accept staff’s funding recommendation with the recommendation that the commission look into ways to increase supports for collaboration and organizational planning. Commissioner Ashlee Jemmott, participating remotely, asks for clarification on how much carryforward will be applied to this funding cycle, and notes her desire for caution in spending down these carryforward funds. RLL shares the Protest process (available at <https://www.ofcy.org/funding/rfp-26-28/>) and Deputy City Administrator (DCA) Navarro highlights that until the protest period ends, no contract can be awarded to any proposed grantees. Commissioner Henderson also asks about housing access under the Independent Living proposed programs. RLL notes that historically, OFCY has not funded housing due to charter parameters and highlights that the Community Homeless Services Division of Human Services focuses on housing. DCA Navarro notes the Citywide effort towards collaborating on services and align funding. Commissioner Delfin thanks those who came for public comment and stayed for the duration of the meeting. Prior to the vote, Commissioner Arline notes that she has a conflict and will need to recuse herself from the votes. Commissioner Llamas also has a conflict leading to recusal. At 8:21 PM, Commissioner Henderson moves to accept staff’s funding recommendations as is and have a further conversation about carryforward availability and options. Commissioner Hiza seconds the motion, moving to a roll call vote. The roll call vote is as follows:

- Ayes: Commissioners Mehouelley, Sally, Hiza, Henderson, Delfin, and Santoscoy
- Abstentions: Commissioners Arline and Llamas.

Timestamp 8:22 PM – Item 6: due to the results of the roll call vote, the item passes. RLL notes that the next meeting will include a carryforward conversation.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Planning and Oversight Committee Adopt the OFCY Staff Recommendation To:

Award Oakland Fund for Children and Youth (OFCY) Grants To Ninety Two (92) Non-Profit and Public Agencies To Operate One Hundred and Thirty Six (136) Distinct Year-Round Programs in An Annual Amount Not To Exceed Twenty Million Six Hundred Seventy Seven Thousand Three Hundred And Fifty Six Dollars (\$20,677,356) for Two Fiscal Years, From July 1, 2026, through June 30, 2027, and From July 1, 2027, through June 30, 2028, contingent upon funding availability and program performance.

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BACKGROUND

The Kids First! Amendment (Article XIII – Amended in 2020) of the City of Oakland Charter requires that three percent (3%) of the General-Purpose Fund be set aside as annual revenues, along with interest accrued and any unspent funds from prior years and appropriated to the Oakland Kids First! Children’s Fund. Ninety percent (90%) of the annual revenue is made available for grants to non- profit and public agencies to address the well-being of Oakland children and youth from birth through age 21. Ten percent (10%) is available for administration and evaluation. The City Council adopted [Ordinance No. 13588 C.M.S.](#) on March 3, 2020, which extended OFCY for twelve (12) years, beginning July 1, 2021, and continuing through June 30, 2033.

On October 16, 2024, the POC unanimously approved the OFCY FY 2025-2028 Strategic Investment Plan (SIP). On December 17, 2024, the City Council approved the OFCY FY 2025-2028 SIP through [Resolution 90580 C.M.S.](#)

Eight funding strategies were approved in the 2025 - 2028, listed below.

1. Family Resource Centers and Parent Engagement
2. Elementary School-Based Expanded Learning
3. Middle School-Based Expanded Learning
4. Youth Development and Leadership
5. Career Access and Employment
6. Youth Summer Jobs/Mayor’s Summer Youth Employment Program
7. Independent Living
8. Place-Based Innovations for Youth Safety

On June 17, 2025, the City Council approved [Resolution 90767 C.M.S.](#) extending FY 2024-2025 grants for FY 2025-2026 to 74 non-profit and public agencies operating 144 district grant programs to allow staff sufficient time to distribute the RFP for the next funding cycle.

On October 24, 2025, OFCY released the Request for Proposals (RFP) to fund programs under the FY 2025 – 2028 SIP. Please refer to the April 15th POC meeting packet and recording for a comprehensive overview of the FY 2026 – 2028 OFCY RFP, including the funding strategies, application timeline, campaign and outreach strategy, proposal submission statistics, and the process for reader recruitment, assignment, and scoring.

Staff reviewed all proposal submissions received by the deadline to ensure that the required proposal elements were provided according to the directions included in the RFP. In accordance with the evaluation criteria outlined in the RFP, all proposals that met the minimum threshold of 70 were considered for funding.

Programs awarded through the sixth funding strategy, Youth Summer Jobs / the Mayor’s Summer Youth Employment Program (MSYEP), were approved by the POC on March 18, 2026. Summer service term programs across other strategies were also approved at this meeting. Please see the POC Meeting Minutes for a list of the approved programs.

The summer program service term allocation was unanimously approved by the Life Enrichment Committee on Tuesday, April 21, 2026. These awards are scheduled for approval by the full City Council on Tuesday, May 5, 2026. Summer service term programming is scheduled to begin on July 1, 2026.

The 136 programs recommended for approval through this memo are for year-round programming.



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OFCY will make awards for a two-year grant cycle, for FY 2026-2027 and FY 2027-2028, contingent upon fund balance, satisfactory evaluation, grant monitoring and overall performance subject to approval by the Planning and Oversight Committee and Oakland City Council. OFCY may extend the grant cycle for additional fiscal years.

ANALYSIS

There are 92 agencies recommended for awards. Of the 92 agencies, 63 (68%) are current OFCY grantees, and 29 (32%) are new grantees for this RFP cycle.

Through approving these funding awards, the estimated number of participants (youth and adult) proposed to be served by year-round programs is 23,947.

Across all proposals, there are more proposals that met the minimum threshold score of 70 / 100 than OFCY can fund.

108 of the 300 year-round proposals (33%) received an average score of 90 / 100 or higher. An additional 78 year-round proposals (24%) received an average score of 85 – 89 /100.

To determine final award allocations for the proposals, OFCY considered the following factors beyond average score, including:

- Geographic population served
- Number of proposals submitted by the agency
- Total funding requested
- Percentage of funding requested from OFCY compared to total program cost
- History in Oakland
- Applied expertise
- Alignment with the 2025 – 2028 SIP
- Funding climate

Significant consideration was given to how programs meet the vision of the FY 2025-2028 SIP to shift OFCY funding toward programs and services that reach older youth in Oakland. As identified in the 2024 OFCY Community Needs Assessment, older youth in Oakland have less programming and services available compared to younger youth.



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Not only do older youth have less access to programs and services, but there are fewer funding streams dedicated to serve this population. In contrast, there are multiple local and state funding streams that serve children, youth, and families from birth through middle school. An overview of three funding streams is below:

1. The California Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELOP)
2. Oakland Children's Initiative (OCI)
3. Alameda County Measure C

The California Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELOP):

ELOP provides funding for school districts, including Oakland Unified School District (OUSD) to offer after-school and summer enrichment programming to students grades TK-6th grade.

When evaluating proposals in the Elementary and Middle school-based Expanded Learning strategies, OFCY funding recommendations considered the amount of ELOP funding received by the agency from OUSD to serve the population described in the proposal. Programs receiving ELOP funding were recommended for \$65,000 for elementary school and \$85,000 for middle school to enable these programs to provide higher quality enrichment activities and experiences to youth served.

ELOP funding is secure through FY 2026-2027. However, it is uncertain whether ELOP funding will be available in FY 2027-2028, the second year covered by this OFCY award term. OFCY staff recommend awards at \$65,000 for elementary school and \$85,000 for middle school programs receiving ELOP funds so that if ELOP funding is eliminated in FY 2027-2028, youth served in these after school programs are still supported.

Oakland Children's Initiative (OCI) and Alameda County Measure C

The Oakland Children's Initiative (Measure AA) is a 2018 Oakland City Charter Amendment to deepen investment in early childcare education and to expand access to scholarships and college for students.

62% of OCI funds are allocated to the Early Education Fund to support early care and education and preschool programs. 31% of OCI funds are allocated to the Oakland Promise Fund to reduce disparities for students in post-secondary education through supporting college and career access.

Measure C is a 0.5% sales tax, generating approximately \$150 million annually, for expanding access to early childhood education in Alameda County. 80% of funds generated are dedicated to supporting child care, preschool, and early education services and programming.

The deeper investment in early childhood education and college access illuminated the gap in funding for programs serving youth, specifically for violence prevention and services for transition-aged youth up to 21.

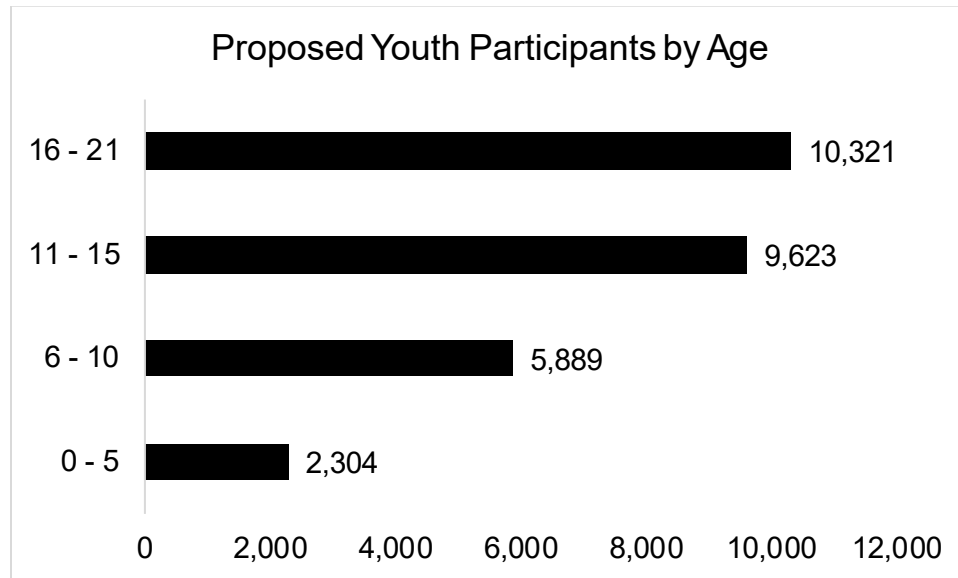
Despite there being additional funding available for programs serving young children and their families, approximately 10% of all proposals received (33 out of 333) were for the Family Resource Center and Parent Engagement strategy. To align with the intention of the FY 2025-2028 SIP to prioritize serving older adults, OFCY staff prioritized programs from agencies that received a score of 90 or above for award for funding. Staff also prioritized awards in the FRC strategy for agencies not receiving funding in other funding strategies.

The chart on the following page demonstrates how the proposed funding awards align with the FY 2025-2028 SIP, prioritizing deeper investment in programs serving youth ages 11 – 21.

Looking at the total allocations (both summer and year-round), the proposed allocations are within the SIP range for the following strategies:

- Family Resource Center (FRC) and Parent Engagement
- Elementary School-Based Expanded Learning
- Independent Living
- Place Based Innovations for Youth Safety

The proposed awards are below the funding range for the Middle School-Based Expanded Learning strategy and the Youth Summer Jobs / Mayor’s Summer Youth Employment Program (MSYEP) strategy.

The proposed awards are above the funding range for the Career Access and Employment strategy and the Youth Development and Leadership strategy.

OFCY staff recommend approving the proposed awards based on the spirit of the strategic investment plan to support older youth. Through deeper investment in Career Access and Employment, OFCY offsets underspending in the Youth Summer Employment Strategy.

OFCY staff recommend approving the deeper investment in the Youth Development strategy, recognizing that it received the highest number of proposals. This was the most competitive funding strategy for awards and received the largest number of proposals.

FISCAL IMPACT

The City of Oakland Adopted Budget for FY 2026-2027 estimates a total allocation of **\$23,264,941.00** for FY 2026-2027 for the Oakland Kids First! Children’s Fund. **\$20,938,447.00 (90%)** is available for grants, and \$2,326,494 (10%) is available for evaluation, strategic planning, and other administrative costs.

OFCY seeks approval to allocate \$20,677,356.00 to year-round grant awards for FY 2026-2027 and 2027-2028. Carry forward (CF) funding will be used in addition to the annual Oakland Kids First! Children’s Fund allocation. The total estimated CF amount from FY 2015-2024 is \$13,297,470. At least \$7,446,793 is available for allocation to grant awards. The final carry forward amount available is pending final confirmation, review, and approval by the City of Oakland Finance Department and City Council.

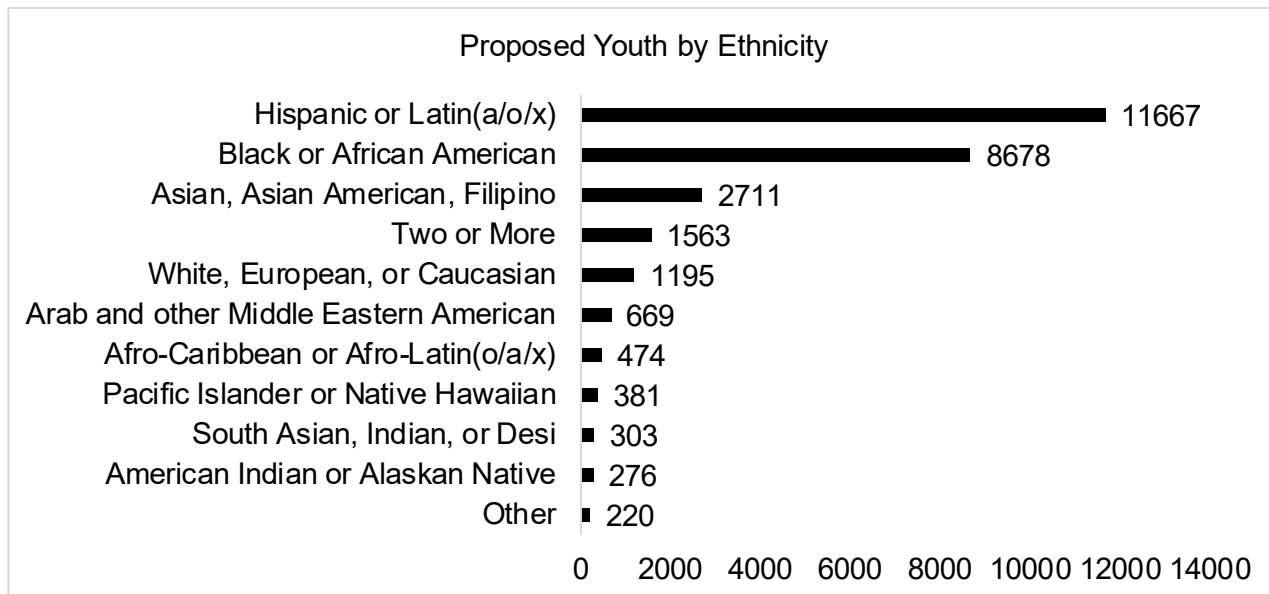
RACE AND EQUITY

OFCY continues to partner with the City of Oakland’s Department of Race & Equity and recognizes the responsibility of implementing the City of Oakland Administrative Instruction 580 (AI580) to ensure funding investments support fairness and justice for all City of Oakland children, youth, and their families by removing barriers and reducing disparities.

OFCY adopted the following equity outcome statement into the FY 2025-2028 SIP:
All children and youth participating in OFCY funded programs will have opportunities to thrive, including those experiencing the most disparities.

OFCY programs predominantly serve participants of color. The largest ethnic category served is participants who identify as Latino/a or Latinx, followed by participants who identify as Black or African American. The chart below shows the demographics of proposed participants for the programs recommended for year-round funding awards.

Timestamp 6:18 PM – Item 5: Presentation: OFCY Budget & Fund Balances. Vi Lo, Human Services Department Fiscal and Budget Manager shares a presentation on OFCY's current budget and plans to utilize carryforward funds for Fiscal Years 2026-2027 and 2027-2028. This presentation is based on the

request from the 5/6/2026 meeting. Slides are attached at the end of these minutes. Commissioner Tchanyoum asks for clarification why utilizing carryforward funds is not always a sustainable practice. VL notes that because these are funds over the allocated budget, relying on carryforward funds could indicate overspending. Commissioner Hiza asks if there is an ideal amount to maintain in the fund. VL notes that there is no ideal amount, but it is good to have some carryforward on-hand. RLL also notes that these are still projections as the budget will not be finalized until November 2026. Commissioner Llamas asks if the fund has been depreciating over time. RLL highlights that the fund has been accruing interest. RLL accepts a question from Angela Howard (member of the public) regarding collaboration with philanthropic funds. RLL highlights that due to the funding landscape, OFCY wishes to avoid overcrowding the philanthropic space, leaving it available to grantee organizations. Commissioner Sally asks about the 90-10 Funding-Administrative breakdown. VL and RLL explain that both amounts are ceilings but based on the whole funding amount, including additions of carryforward funding. RLL accepts a question from Laura Cabral (member of the public) regarding past carryforward spending. RLL highlights that the most recent City Auditor's report outlining this information is available on the City Auditor's website (<https://www.oaklandauditor.com/reports/all-reports/>), and the slides from the presentation will be made available after the meeting. Commissioner Henderson (Adult, Mayor) arrives at 7:42 PM. Co-Chair Jemmott notes that members of the public are required to wait for Public Forum to provide their comments. Commissioner Delfin asks how the carryforward fund is replenished. RLL highlights that the carryforward fund is unspent dollars from previous fiscal years and interest accrued on those dollars. VL cautions against relying on these funds, especially as the overall city budget continues to contract. Commissioner Powers suggests the establishment of a percentage or amount to maintain in the carryforward budget. Co-Chair Jemmott makes a motion to initiate the conversation on draw down practices for future periods of prosperity or funding limitations. Commissioner Delfin seconds the motion. Commissioner Henderson offers a friendly amendment to the motion to include projections based on past history and current statuses. The motion passes with 10 in favor, Commissioner Tchanyoum abstaining, and none opposed.

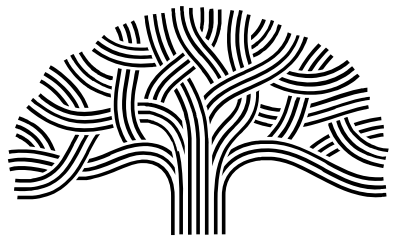

Section 1300: OFCY receives revenues in an amount equal to 3% of the City of Oakland's annual actual unrestricted General Purpose Fund (Fund 1010) revenues and appropriated, together with any interest earned on the Fund and any amounts unspent or uncommitted by the Fund at the end of any fiscal year. Dear Planning and Oversight Committee Members,

We are writing on behalf of [Oakland Starting Smart and Strong \(OSSS\)](#), an early childhood table in Oakland composed of a wide variety of stakeholders that includes public systems, community organizations, parent advocacy organizations, and philanthropy. Our Task Force includes over 40 agency partners working together for children and families in Oakland.

The OFCY leadership and staff are important partners in our collaborative effort. We recognize the extraordinary care and rigor that OFCY staff, leadership, and the POC bring to the grant-making process. We are grateful for the transparency with which the FY 2025–2028 OFCY Strategic Investment Plan and its underlying Community Needs Assessment were developed and communicated. We want to emphasize that we write this letter in a spirit of partnership and with a shared commitment to the well-being of all Oakland youth.

While we were disappointed to see the elimination of some of the dedicated funding streams for early childhood in the Plan and the subsequent Request for Proposals for FY 26-28, we respect OFCY's rationale for prioritizing older youth. However, we are concerned about the timing, the unintended consequences of these changes, and the impact of the FY 26-28 funding decisions on the early childhood ecosystem. The primary concern is not simply a reduction in funding, but the potential disruption of trusted services that hundreds of Oakland families with young children rely on for developmental, mental health, and family support. **We are requesting the OFCY Planning and Oversight Committee consider ways to mitigate the impact of these funding decisions on young children and their families.**

What the Data Shows

A [comparison](#) of FY 2025–26 awards to the FY 2026–28 proposed awards shows a reduction of \$908,381 in early childhood funding from \$3,036,035 to \$2,127,653. **This represents a 30% and close to \$1 million decrease.** This reflects both the elimination of the Social-Emotional Well-Being in Early Childhood funding strategy and the non-renewal of Family Resource Center and Parent Engagement programs that collectively served hundreds of Oakland families with young children.



Previously funded programs that reapplied and were not recommended for funding in FY 2026–28 include:

- Safe Passages – Baby Learning Communities Collaborative (\$499,936)
- EBAC – Hawthorne Family Resource Center (\$238,474)
- Lincoln – Early Childhood Mental Health Collaborative / NEST (\$475,000)
- Lotus Bloom - Culturally Responsive Family Resource Center: Downtown (\$248,993)

Note: Lotus Bloom was recommended for funding for its Room to Bloom location

Why the Timing Is Especially Difficult

There are three factors that make this transition difficult:

- 1) While Measure C and the Oakland Children’s Initiative do represent meaningful new investments in early childhood, both measures include explicit non-supplantation clauses. These provisions were written precisely to prevent public agencies from reducing existing investments on the assumption that new funds from these sources will fill the gap and result in no meaningful gains made in serving the early childhood population.
- 2) We also want to acknowledge the difficult position these organizations found themselves in. While the Strategic Investment Plan was clear that Social-Emotional Well-Being in Early Childhood strategy would be eliminated and the RFP did not include it, programs were not precluded from applying under the Family Resource Center and Parent Engagement strategy and effectively increased the competition between organizations serving children ages 0-5 for fewer funds.

They applied in good faith, trusting that a strong track record and competitive application could result in continued funding. As a result, they had little basis to begin transition planning until award decisions were made. With the new fiscal year just weeks away, they now have almost no runway to wind down services responsibly or pursue alternative funding.

When a funding strategy is sunset, responsible stewardship includes supporting grantees in closing out programs in a way that minimizes harm to the families who depend on them. Bridge funding in circumstances like these is widely recognized as a best practice in public grant-making.

- 3) First 5 Alameda County paused its Family Resource Center RFP process, removing a funding option that many of the organizations operating Family Resource Centers hoped to receive this summer.



Our Request

We are asking the Planning and Oversight Committee to consider options to ease this transition for the programs that received funding in FY 25–26 but were not recommended for FY26–28:

- 1) We ask the Committee to explore whether OFCY emergency or reserve funds could support currently funded programs that will not be receiving new support on a short-term basis. Working with the organizations to find out the feasibility of this option would avoid abrupt service disruptions to the families they serve.
- 2) We also ask OFCY to work directly with organizations that were funded for a program model at one location but not at another with the same program model to identify where flexibility could be the difference between continuation and closure. Allowing organizations to adapt their service locations would go a long way toward preserving continuity of care for families at minimal additional cost.
- 3) We encourage OFCY to partner and coordinate with other funders in the early childhood space to align across systems and funding streams to strengthen Oakland’s early childhood infrastructure.

Oakland has spent years building a coordinated early childhood infrastructure that includes family resource centers, mental health supports, parent leadership programs, and community-based partnerships. Once programs close, rebuilding that infrastructure is difficult and costly.

Thank you for your consideration and for all that OFCY does for Oakland’s children and youth. We look forward to continued partnership.
