SUMMARY

Oakland Parks, Recreation and Youth Development (OPRYD) received a request from Circus Bella, to accept donations during multiple site for performance, at DeFremery Park (June 8, 2023), Lincoln Square Park (July 13, 2023) and San Antonio Park (June 30, 2023). Circus Bella offers free and affordable performances and develops partnerships with diverse community organizations.

FISCAL IMPACT

There no fiscal impact to OPRYD funding. Circus Bella will be reducing the cost and will be responsible for all other cost related to the performance at Defremery Park, Lincoln Square Park, San Antonio Park.

PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

OPRYD will host Circus in the Parks - A themed series of FREE summer performances in parks and open spaces in the Bay Area, open to the community. The 60-minute performance features an outdoor ring, our live Circus Bella All-Star Band and the Circus Bella company. The show, which delights all ages, features a diverse cast of acrobats, aerialists, jugglers, clowns and more. This summer we are schedule to perform at DeFremery Park on June 8, 2023; Lincoln Square Park on June 13, 2023; and San Antonio Park on June 30, 2023.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

Circus Bella was founded by David Hunt and Abigail Munn in 2007 with a dream to engage diverse audiences by creating a one-ring circus in partnership with a broad array of community organizations; and to provide performance experiences—simultaneously challenging and rewarding—for its diverse artists.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission approve Circus Bella's request to collect donations hosted by OPRYD sites.

Circus Bella is writing to PRAC to request the ability to "pass the hat" and sell merchandise at our Preview/Final Dress Rehearsal at De Fremery Park on June 8, 2023 at 5:30pm, our performance at Lincoln Square Park as part of Lincoln Summer Nights on July 13, 2023 and a possible performance at San Antonio Park on Friday June 30, 2023. Based on previous experience, we expect to collect approximately \$300 in donations and receive \$100 in net merchandise sales at DeFremery Park, \$1200 in donations and \$499 in net merchandise sales at Lincoln Square Park ,and \$350 in donations and \$125 in net merchandise at San Antonio Park. The funds help contribute to the costs of bringing our FREE, Circus in the Parks performance series to Studio One Arts Center. Money raised goes directly to employing local Circus Arts and Musicians for the performance.

Since our founding in 2008, the mission of Circus Bella has been to produce and present high-quality circus arts entertainment, accessible to all audiences. We pursue excellence in a modern one-ring circus, combining past traditions with forward-thinking sensibilities and flair, while honoring universal human potential. Aerialists, acrobats, jugglers, and clowns abound. We celebrate the beauty of circus art; we delight in unifying people with joyous and magical experiences that cross age, culture, and language barriers.

Distinguished by the diversity of its members, our company reflects the rich diversity of the Bay Area, thereby making our performances highly relatable to diverse audiences. Our multicultural ensemble of Bay Area residents includes individuals from a variety of races, genders, sexual orientations, and socio-economic backgrounds, e.g., Black, Chinese, Filipino, Latino and European, as well as ages ranging from children through adults. Artists are employed performers, underscoring our intentional focus on ensuring that local artists receive competitive employment and a venue to pursue their creative careers. We also partner with Oakland's Prescott Circus Theatre. Their young circus students participate in our shows, gaining valuable experience and additional skills.

We have completed 123years of free *Circus in the Parks* performances—our core programming. Over the years we have presented 166 free performances in 36 locations to audiences of 80,000+ people and have had the privilege of working at various recreation centers in the City of Oakland since 2009. Past Oakland locations have included: DeFremery Park, Dimond Park, Studio One Arts Center and Mosswood Park.

Although funds collected do not cover the entire expense of one performance every contribution makes a difference in allowing the company to continue to bring FREE circus to the Studio One Arts Center community. The current cost of our show which includes fair artist salaries, insurance, scenery, costumes and transportation is about \$10,000 per show.

Bringing a Circus to a park creates an opportunity for people to join together as a community. Audiences are bedazzled, lifted up, and they join in the celebration of the heart and soul of circus: community, joy, and achieving the impossible. We are delighted at the possibility of bringing this experience to the City of Oakland for the 14^h year.

AGREEMENT FOR OAKLAND TRYBE TO EXECUTE PROGRAMMING AND INSTALL TEMPORARY PROGRAMMING INFRASTRUCTURE AT

THE SAN ANTONIO TENNIS COURTS.

SUMMARY

The request is for the Parks and Recreation Commission to recommend approval of a License Agreement for Oakland TRYBE to execute year-round programming and install temporary programming infrastructure at the San Antonio Tennis Courts. Oakland TRYBE is an important community partner in the San Antonio Community that executes vital programming and other resources throughout the San Antonio, Little Saigon, Eastlake and Fruitvale neighborhoods in Oakland. TRYBE's summer programming at San Antonio Park, in collaboration with Vertical Skillz, Soccer without Borders, and StreetSoccerUSA, intends to expand onto the tennis courts with the goal to provide 16 hours of daily, relevant, engaging, and free programming for residents.

In particular, the programming will serve seniors, school-aged and transitional age youth, infants/toddlers and caregivers, and immigrants/refugees. Programming will center on community resilience through distribution of food and other necessities, emergency resource navigation, and community safety and celebration events. The infrastructure being stored will be four (4) programming 'pods' stored on the second of the four courts (see Exhibit A). The projected date for installation and storage of 'pods' is dependent on the allocation of a License Agreement, however, TRYBE is ready to install and begin programming as early as June 12th, 2023, and would continue until June 11th, 2024. Use of the Tennis Courts will align with the proposed uses in the Draft San Antonio Park Master Plan and is temporary in nature and therefore does not require a Minor Conditional Use Permit but the City and TRYBE still believe it is important to receive a recommendation from the PRAC for this proposal.

FISCAL IMPACT

There will be no fiscal impact to the City. TRYBE intends to be responsible for and continue upkeep of the courts and has already allocated funds for the movement of the 'pods' to the intended site. TRYBE will not be charging for any programs, resources, or other services that they offer on the site, adding a net gain to the overall community.

PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Oakland TRYBE's request for a License Agreement is centered in the goal of reactivating an already blighted and underutilized space by executing targeted programming, resource distribution, and community engagement for under-resourced communities. TRYBE cohabitates the San Antonio Rec

Center, which, due to its size, provides little to no inside or sheltered programming, storage, or office space. TRYBE intends to expand their programming to the San Antonio Tennis Courts to both activate the space, as well as create more programming space to serve youth, seniors, and other residents in the surrounding community. Programming will also include and incorporate other community organizations, such as Vertical Skills, StreetSoccerUSA, Soccer Without Borders, Friends of San Antonio Park, EBAYC, and others to deliver consistent, impactful programming to the targeted communities around the park.

The intention is to start the installation of storage and 'pods' as soon as possible, to support the programming series already happening, and start activation early to mitigate issues in the summer with usage. Movement and installation of 'pods' would take a maximum of four (4) weeks, allowing for a minimum of eleven (11) months of programming at zero expense to the City. TRYBE will return to PRAC with data and recommendations about continuing space usage at the end of the term, at which time, they hope to extend the usage another year at least.

PROGRAMMING:

Programing will happen throughout the tennis courts, and explained in Exhibit B.

- Tennis Court 1/Top Tennis Court: Utilized by Vertical Skills Sports Outreach to do:
 - Youth boxing and Fitness Program
 - Community Events
- Tennis Courts 2 & 3: Utilized by TRYBE to do:

 - Neighborhood Coalition Events and Community Events focused on San Antonio Park
 & Neighborhood
 - o Health Clinics for under-resourced residents and unhoused residents;
 - o Soccer/Futsol to be managed by soccer organizations/groups
- Tennis Court 4: Utilized by the Community for:
 - o Tennis and other racquet sports
 - Soccer
 - Dancing
 - o Dog Training
 - o Racketball
 - o Volleyball
 - Lounging
 - o Catch

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

TRYBE, along with multiple other community partners, has been organizing around building up the resources and services coming out of the San Antonio Park, and this is a natural evolution of that organizing. While it is not intended to be a permanent structure, it is an opportunity for the City to work with community-based partners who can add significant worth both to the physical offerings, and overall security to one of our parks.

RECOMMENDATION

The District 2 Council Office recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission recommend approval of the License Agreement of the San Antonio Tennis Courts by Oakland TRYBE for the term of June 12th, 2023, to June 11th, 2024. The recommended usage will allow for a more activated San Antonio Park, which will increase community safety, engagement, and overall wellbeing.


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



COMMISSION TO ENDORSE THE TYRONE CARNEY PARK

RENOVATION PROJECT AND RECOMMEND APPROVAL OF THE PROPOSED CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT TO THE ZONING MANAGER.

PROJECT SUMMARY

Bureau of Planning staff requests input and a recommendation from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) regarding a proposed Minor Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for site renovations to reopen Tyrone Carney Park, which is at 10501 Acalanes Drive, at the intersection with 105th Avenue, in the Brookfield Village and Sobrante Park neighborhood. The park is part of the Oakland Recreation and Youth Development Department's park system and has received State funds for improvements. The CUP will require a discretionary review and final decision by the Zoning Manager after a public notice.

The park is approximately 18,431 square feet in area and has been closed for at least 20 years. The development proposal seeks to remove the basketball court, play structures, furniture, and landscaping. The project will include the construction of children's playground equipment, exercise par-course equipment, furniture, landscaping, lighting, gates, and perimeter fencing.

The proposal includes a tree permit for the removal of at least five protected trees, located within the park adjacent to 105th Avenue and Acalanes Drive. This permit will be reviewed under separately by the City Tree Services Division within the Department of Public Works. The project includes the installation of at least 18, 24-inch box-sized trees, 18 five-gallon trees, and a mix of five-gallon shrubs within the park.

The project was identified as a priority in the East Oakland Neighborhoods Initiative Community Plan (EONI 2021) with the goal to improve and enhance recreational facilities in the neighborhoods.

Staff recommends that the PRAC advise the Zoning Manager to approve the Minor Conditional Use Permit required for the proposal. The project was designed with extensive community input and will result in a renovated park with new equipment, a central plaza, and landscaping.

FISCAL IMPACT

The project was awarded \$2.46 Million from the California State Department of Parks and Recreation (Parks Bond Act of 2018, also known as Prop 68) to cover the costs of project

management, design, construction, and workforce training. In addition, the proposed project will be receiving funds of \$728,000 from the City's Transformative Climate Communities (TCC) program to supplement project construction costs and for artistic metalwork through a workforce training program.

Park maintenance will be provided by the Department of Public Works through ongoing funding sources. As a requirement for receiving Proposition 68 funds, the City has committed to 30 years of ongoing maintenance after the completion of the refurbished park. The Oakland City Council adopted Resolution 87823 C.M.S. to accept the Prop 68 grant and the responsibility to design and construct the renovations.

PROJECT SITE & EXISTING CONDITIONS

The triangle-shaped Tyrone Carney Park is located at 10501 Acalanes Drive at the intersection of 105th Avenue in the Brookfield Village and Sobrante Park neighborhood. The park is surrounded by residential properties and a mix of commercial and industrial zone properties to the north at the intersection of 105th and Edes Avenues.

The park was constructed in 1968 and was named after Tyrone Carney, a neighborhood Boy Scout who graduated from Castlemont High School who volunteered and served with the US Marines in the Vietnam War and died in 1968.

In 2002, the park closed due to crime activity and security concerns. Currently, the park is inaccessible and contains a deteriorated basketball court, children's playground structures, and other facilities such as picnic tables, benches, light poles, fences, and landscaping.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Pedestrian access to the park will include two new four-foot-wide metal picket gates, one on Acalanes Drive and one on 105th Avenue. The entrances will include die-cut metal letters above an arched entry metal gateway. A new Public Works service driveway with a twelve-foot-wide double swing metal picket gate is also proposed on Acalanes Drive.

The proposal will use at least three different types of surface materials, including concrete paving, rubber surfacing, and turf and a mix of planting areas. The center of the park will have a concrete, circular-shaped plaza surrounded by a group of raised planters with 2.5- and 3.5-foot-tall custom picket fences and three 24-inch box trees. A sculpture dedicated to Tyrone Carney is proposed to be in the center of the plaza. The City proposes to collaborate with local artists on the sculpture.

Swings, flex rubber balls, and a net climber attached to a rubber surface will be placed at the southwest and southeast areas of the park. Curved planting areas with a concrete seat wall, cluster of boulders and a mix of 24-inch box trees and five-gallon shrubs will be placed behind the children's play structure. Six bicycle racks are proposed within the park.

The project will contain a par-course area with a selection of equipment, including jump bars, parallel bars, plyometrics steps, a horizontal ladder, and horizontal bars on a rubber surface. Like the

south part of the park, the north side will have landscaping, including a mix of 24-inch box trees, five-gallon shrubs, a cluster of boulders, and the existing mature trees on Acalanes Drive.

Other improvements include the construction of a new six-foot-tall metal picket fence adjacent to the streets, repairing the six-foot-tall, chain-link fence along the southerly property line (as needed), installing three 20-foot-tall double fixture park lights at the pedestrian entry gates and service driveway, and installing two new streetlight fixtures at the existing PG&E pole at the corner of the park.

The proposed hours of operation will be from 6:00am to 9:00pm daily and the park will be managed by the City's Department of Public Works. The project estimates attracting approximately 100 patrons daily.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

In 2017, a group led by community members from the East Oakland Neighborhoods Initiative (EONI) worked to develop a vision to improve the well-being and address neighborhood concerns of East Oakland residents. One of the topics the neighborhood identified was to improve and reopen parks. EONI collaborated with the City of Oakland Public Works to develop goals and design concepts for Tyrone Carney Park.

Input regarding the park improvements were designed during five community meetings hosted by the Sobrante Park Resident Action Council (SPRAC) and Neighborhood Crime Prevention Council between January and July of 2029. All meetings were held at the nearby Madison Park Academy, which is at 400 Capistrano Drive in Oakland.

The meetings resulted in a community-led grant proposal that resulted in conceptual plans, renderings, and a budget that included a complete renovation of the park, including the following features:

- Play equipment (climbing net structure and boulders);
- Memorial to Tyrone Carney;
- Plaza with ornamental paving;
- Walking paths;
- Lawn;
- Wrought iron fence around perimeter;
- Landscaping (trees and plants);
- Bike racks;
- Drinking fountain; and
- Artwork design and completed by community members.

With support from the Alameda County Probation Department, former District 7 City Councilmember, and the County Supervisor, community members filed a grant application to the State Department of Parks and Recreation, which resulted in a \$2.46 million grant using Proposition 68 funds.

CRIME PREVENTION THROUGH ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN

Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) is a crime prevention philosophy based on the theory that the proper design and effective use of the built environment can lead to a reduction of the fear of crime as well as an improvement in the quality of life.

The project proposal was reviewed by the City's CPTED representative, who found the design met the principles by providing fencing and landscaping transparency, sufficient lighting, and strategic park entries.

GENERAL AND SPECIFIC PLAN ANALYSIS

Land Use and Transportation Element of the General Plan

The property is classified as a Detached Unit Residential by the Land Use and Transportation Element of the General Plan (LUTE). The intent of the Detached Unit Residential land use classification is to create, maintain, and enhance residential areas characterized by detached, single unit structures. The desired character and uses of future development within this classification is intended to remain residential in character with appropriate allowances for schools and other small scale civic institutions. A small resident serving park is consistent with this intent.

Open Space, Conservation, and Preservation Element of the General Plan

As the City's official policy document addressing the management of open space, natural resources, and parks, the Open Space, Conservation, and Preservation Element of the General Plan (OSCAR) contains goals, objectives, policies, and actions on a diverse range of topics, including urban parks.

OSCAR Objective OS2 for Urban Parks is to maintain urban parks which provides open space for outdoor recreation, psychological and physical well-being and relied from urban environment. The applicable policy for the project includes:

• Policy OS-2.1. Protection of Park Open Space: Manage Oakland's urban parks to protect and enhance their open space character while accommodating a wide range of outdoor recreational activities. A variety of outdoor recreational activities should continue to be provided and activities should be compatible with the environment and character of the park.

The OSCAR also contains Planning Areas Strategies within different communities in Oakland. Each strategy translates the broad, citywide policies into more specific priorities for smaller geographic areas. The strategies also present recommendations to be considered as future decisions are made regarding the City's parks and open spaces. Park recommendations for Tyrone Carney Park:

• The mini-park currently has security problems that reduce its use for legitimate purposes. It would benefit from a community-led, city-supported effort to rethink the park's function and

explore ways it could be made more secure or even relocated. The possibility of adding ornamental fencing around the site or introducing new uses such as community gardening should be considered.

ZONING ANALYSIS

The City's Zoning Maps classifies Tyrone Carney Park as being in the Open Space Zone with a subclassification of Urban Active Mini Park. The regulations for the Open Space Zone are in Chapter 17.11 of the Planning Code. According to that Chapter, the Zone is intended to create, preserve, and enhance land for permanent open space to meet the active and passive recreational needs of Oakland residents and to promote park uses which are compatible with surrounding land uses and City's natural environment. The zone is typically only designated in of public open space areas.

Required Planning Permits

The proposal for the demolition and construction of new playgrounds/children's play equipment of less than 1,000 square feet and other site improvements requires a Minor Conditional Use Permit per Section 17.11.060 of the City of Oakland Planning Code. Minor Conditional Use Permits require approval by the Zoning Manager. Section 17.135.030 of the Planning Code also requires a recommendation regarding the Minor Conditional Use Permit application by the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC).

In addition to the Minor Conditional Use Permit, the proposal will require a separate Tree Removal Permit for removal of trees within the property. The tree permit will be separately reviewed by the Tree Services Division of the Department of Public Works.

Required Findings

A Conditional Use Permit may only be granted upon a determination that the proposal conforms to the general Conditional Use Permit Criteria contained in Section 17.134.050 and to the no net loss tracking provisions contained in Section 17.135.060(B) of the Planning Code as summarized below.

Conditional Use Permit Criteria (Section 17.134.050 of the Planning Code):

- A. That the location, size, design, and operating characteristics of the proposed development will be compatible with and will not adversely affect the livability or appropriate development of abutting properties and the surrounding neighborhood, with consideration to be given to harmony in scale, bulk, coverage, and density; to the availability of civic facilities and utilities; to harmful effect, if any, upon desirable neighborhood character; to the generation of traffic and the capacity of surrounding streets; and to any other relevant impact of the development.
- B. That the location, design, and site planning of the proposed development will provide a convenient and functional living, working, shopping, or civic environment, and will be as attractive as the nature of the use and its location and setting warrant.

- C. That the proposed development will enhance the successful operation of the surrounding area in its basic community functions or will provide an essential service to the community or region.
- D. That the proposal conforms to all applicable regular design review criteria set forth in the regular design review procedure at <u>Section 17.136.050</u>.
- E. That the proposal conforms in all significant respects with the Oakland General Plan and with any other applicable guidelines or criteria, district plan or development control map which has been adopted by the Planning Commission or City Council.

No Net Loss Finding (Section 17.135.060(B) of the Planning Code):

B. Unless overriding considerations exist, approval of any increase in structure coverage within the OS Zone shall be contingent on a finding that there has been no net loss of urban parkland from the time of the baseline date.

Development Standards

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission provide input to the Zoning Manager regarding the Minor Conditional Use Permit for improvements at the Tyrone Carney Park. Staff believes that the proposal will provide a safe and attractive amenity to the neighborhood and meets the findings required for the issuance of a Conditional Use Permit. Therefore, staff recommends the PRAC advise the Zoning Manager to approve the project.

- I. ALL LANDSCAPE AND MAINTENANCE OF SAME SHALL CONFORM TO CITY OF OAKLAND LANDSCAPE AND IRRIGATION GUIDELINES, AND ANY OTHER APPLICABLE CODES, ORDINANCES AND LAWS.
- 2. LANDSCAPE CONTRACTOR SHALL COORDINATE ALL WORK WITH RELATED CONTRACTORS AND WITH THE GENERAL CONSTRUCTION OF THE PROJECT.
- 3. VERIFY ALL SITE CONDITIONS AND UTILITY LOCATIONS PRIOR TO COMMENCING WORK.
- 4. LAYOUT OF PLANT MATERIALS SHOWN ON DRAWINGS ARE APPROXIMATE. Materials storage & spill cleanup

Non-hazardous materials management

- Sand, dirt, and similar materials must be stored at least 10 feet (3 meters) from catch basins. All construction material must be covered with a tarp and contained with a perimeter control during wet weather or when rain is forecasted or when not actively being used within 14 days.
- ✓ Use (but don't overuse) reclaimed water for dust control as needed.
- ✓ Sweep or vacuum streets and other paved areas daily. Do not wash down streets or work areas with water!
- Recycle all asphalt, concrete, and aggregate base material from demolition activities. Comply with City of 0akland Ordinances for recycling construction materials, wood, gyp board, pipe, etc.
- ✓ Check dumpsters regularly for leaks and to make sure they are not overfilled.

 Repair or replace leaking dumpsters promptly.
- Cover all dumpsters with a tarp at the end of every work day or during wet weather.

Hazardous materials management

- Label all hazardous materials and hazardous wastes (such as pesticides, paints, thinners, solvents, fuel, oil, and antifreeze) in accordance with city, county, state, and federal regulations.
- ✓ Store hazardous materials and wastes in water tight containers, store in appropriate secondary containment, and cover them at the end of every work day or during wet weather or when rain is forecasted.
- Follow manufacturer's application instructions for hazardous materials and be careful not to use more than necessary. Do not apply chemicals outdoors when rain is forecasted within 24 hours.
- ✓ Be sure to arrange for appropriate disposal of all hazardous wastes.

Spill prevention and control

- ✓ Keep a stockpile of spill cleanup materials (rags, absorbents, etc.) available at the construction site at all times.
- When spills or leaks occur, contain them immediately and be particularly careful to prevent leaks and spills from reaching the gutter, street, or storm drain.

 Never wash spilled material into a gutter, street, storm drain, or creek!
- Dispose of all containment and cleanup materials properly.
- Report any hazardous materials spills immediately! Dial 911 or City of 0akland Public Works Agency dispatch at (510) 615-5566

Construction Entrances and Perimeter

- ✓ Establish and maintain effective perimeter controls and stabilize all construction entrances and exits to sufficiently control erosion and sediment discharges from site and tracking off site.
- Sweep or vacuum any street tracking immediately and secure sediment source to prevent further tracking.

Vehicle and equipment maintenance & cleaning

Oakland requirements.

✓ Inspect vehicles and equipment for leaks

frequently. Use drip pans to catch leaks until repairs are made; repair leaks promptly.

- Fuel and maintain vehicles on site only in a bermed area or over a drip pan that is big enough to prevent runoff.
- ✓ If you must clean vehicles or equipment on site, clean with water only in a
- bermed area that will not allow rinse water to run into gutters, streets, storm drains, or creeks.
- ✓ Do not clean vehicles or equipment on-site using soaps, solvents, degreasers, steam cleaning equipment, etc.



Earthwork & contaminated soils

- ✓ Keep excavated soil on the site where it will not collect in the street.
- ✓ Transfer to dump trucks should take place on the site, not in the street.
- ✓ Use fiber rolls, silt fences, or other control measures to minimize the flow of silt off the site.



- ✓ Earth moving activities
 are only allowed during dry weather
 by permit and as approved by the City
 Inspector in the Field.
- erosion control. Minimize disturbance to existing vegetation whenever possible.

 If you disturb a slope during construction, prevent erosion by securing the soil with erosion control fabric, or seed with fast-growing grasses as soon as possible. Place fiber rolls down-slope until soil is secure.

✓ Mature vegetation is the best form of

✓ If you suspect contamination (from site history, discoloration, odor, texture, abandoned underground tanks or pipes, or buried debris), call the Engineer for help in determining what should be done, and manage disposal of cntaminated soil according to their instructions.

Dewatering operations

- ✓ Effectively manage all run-on, all runoff within the site, and all runoff that discharges from the site. Run-on from off site shall be directed away from all disturbed areas or shall collectively be in compliance.
- Reuse water for dust control, irrigation, or another on-site purpose to the greatest extent possible.
- ✓ Be sure to notify and obtain approval from the Engineer before discharging water to a street, gutter, or storm drain. Filtration or diversion through a basin, tank, or sediment trap may be required.
- In areas of known contamination, testing is required prior to reuse or discharge of groundwater. Consult with the Engineer to determine what testing is required and how to interpret results.

 Contaminated groundwater must be treated or hauled off-site for proper disposal.

Saw cutting

- Always completely cover or barricade storm drain inlets when saw cutting. Use filter fabric, catch basin inlet filters, or sand/gravel bags to keep slurry out of the storm drain system.
- Shovel, absorb, or vacuum saw-cut slurry and pick up all waste as soon as you are finished in one location or at the end of each work day (whichever is sooner!).
- ✓ If saw cut slurry enters a catch basin, clean it up immediately.

Paving/asphalt work



- ✓ Always cover storm drain inlets and manholes when paving or applying seal coat, tack coat, slurry seal, or fog seal.
- ✓ Protect gutters, ditches, and drainage courses with sand/gravel bags, or earthen berms.
- ✓ Do not sweep or wash down excess sand from sand sealing into gutters, storm drains, or creeks. Collect sand and return it to the stockpile, or dispose of it as trash.
- ✓ Do not use water to wash down fresh asphalt concrete pavement.

Concrete, grout, and mortar storage & waste disposal

- ✓ Store concrete, grout, and mortar under cover, on pallets, and away from drainage areas. These materials must never reach a storm drain.
- ✓ Wash out concrete equipment/trucks off-site or into contained washout areas that will not allow discharge of wash water onto the underlying soil or onto the surrounding areas.



Collect the wash water from washing exposed aggregate concrete and remove it for appropriate disposal off site.

Painting

- Never rinse paint brushes or
 materials in a gutter or street!
 Paint out excess water-based paint before rinsing brushes,
 rollers, or containers in a sink.
- Paint out excess oil-based paint before cleaning brushes in thinner.
 Filter paint thinners and solvents for reuse whenever possible.
- Dispose of oil-based paint sludge and unusable thinner as hazardous waste.

Landscape Materials

- Contain, cover, and store on pallets all stockpiled landscape materials (mulch, compost, fertilizers, etc.) during wet weather or when rain is forecasted or when not actively being used within 14 days.
- ✓ Discontinue the application of any erodible landscape material within 2 days of forecasted rain and during wet weather.

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Pollution Prevention - It's Part of the Plan

Make sure your crews and subs do the job right!

Runoff from streets and other paved areas is a major source of pollution and damage to creeks and the San Francisco Bay. Construction activities can directly affect the health of creeks and the Bay unless contractors and crews plan ahead to keep dirt, debris, and other construction waste away from storm drains and local creeks. Following these guidelines and the project specifications will ensure your compliance with City of



Materials storage & spill cleanup

Non-hazardous materials management

- Sand, dirt, and similar materials must be stored at least 10 feet (3 meters) from catch basins. All construction material must be covered with a tarp and contained with a perimeter control during wet weather or when rain is forecasted or when not actively being used within 14 days.
- Use (but don't overuse) reclaimed water for dust control as needed
- ✓ Sweep or vacuum streets and other paved areas daily. Do not wash down streets or work areas with water!
- Recycle all asphalt, concrete, and aggregate base material from demolition activities. Comply with City of Oakland Ordinances for recycling construction materials, wood, gyp board, pipe, etc.
- Check dumpsters regularly for leaks and to make sure they are not overfilled. Repair or replace leaking dumpsters promptly.
- Cover all dumpsters with a tarp at the end of every work day or during wet weather.

Hazardous materials management

- Label all hazardous materials and hazardous wastes (such as pesticides, paints, thinners, solvents, fuel, oil, and antifreeze) in accordance with city, county, state, and federal regulations.
- ✓ Store hazardous materials and wastes in water tight containers, store in appropriate secondary containment, and cover them at the end of every work day or during wet weather or when rain is forecasted.
- Follow manufacturer's application instructions for hazardous materials and be careful not to use more than necessary. Do not apply chemicals outdoors when rain is forecasted within 24 hours
- ✓ Be sure to arrange for appropriate disposal of all hazardous wastes.

Spill prevention and control

- Keep a stockpile of spill cleanup materials (rags, absorbents, etc.) available at the construction site at all times.
- ✓ When spills or leaks occur, contain them immediately and be particularly careful to prevent leaks and spills from reaching the gutter, street, or storm drain. Never wash spilled material into a gutter, street, storm drain, or creek!
- Dispose of all containment and cleanup materials properly.
- Report any hazardous materials spills immediately! Dial 911 or City of Oakland Public Works Agency dispatch at (510) 615-5566

Construction Entrances and Perimeter

- Establish and maintain effective perimeter controls and stabilize all construction entrances and exits to sufficiently control erosion and sediment discharges from site and tracking off site.
- Sweep or vacuum any street tracking immediately and secure sediment source to prevent further tracking.



Vehicle and equipment

Oakland requirements.

- until repairs are made; repair leaks Fuel and maintain vehicles on site only in a bermed area or over a drip pan that
- If you must clean vehicles or equipment on site, clean with water only in a bermed area that will not allow rinse water to run into gutters, streets, storm drains, or creeks,

is big enough to prevent runoff.

Do not clean vehicles or equipment on-site using soaps, solvents, degreasers, steam cleaning equipment, etc.

Earthwork & contaminated soils

- Keep excavated soil on the site where it will not collect in the street,
- ransfer to dump trucks should take place on the site, not in the street.
- ✓ Use fiber rolls, silt fences, or other control measures to minimize the flow of silt off the site.



- Earth moving activities are only allowed during dry weather by permit and as approved by the City Inspector in the Field.
- Mature vegetation is the best form of erosion control. Minimize disturbance to existing vegetation whenever possible.
- ✓ If you disturb a slope during construction, prevent erosion by securing the soil with erosion control fabric, or seed with fastgrowing grasses as soon as possible. Place fiber rolls down-slope until soil is secure.
- ✓ If you suspect contamination (from site history, discoloration, odor, texture, abandoned) underground tanks or pipes, or buried debris), call the Engineer for help in determining what should be done, and manage disposal of entaminated soil according to their instructions,

Dewatering operations

- ✓ Effectively manage all run-on, all runoff within the site, and all runoff that discharges from the site. Run-on from off site shall be directed away from all disturbed areas or shall collectively be in compliance.
- Reuse water for dust control, irrigation, or another on-site purpose to the greatest
- Be sure to notify and obtain approval from the Engineer before discharging water to a street, gutter, or storm drain. Filtration or diversion through a basin, tank, or sediment trap may be required.
- In areas of known contamination, testing is required prior to reuse or discharge of groundwater. Consult with the Engineer to determine what testing is required and how to interpret results, Contaminated groundwater must be treated or hauled off-site for proper disposal.

Saw cutting

- Always completely cover or barricade storm drain inlets when saw cutting. Use filter fabric, catch basin inlet filters, or sand/gravel bags to keep slurry out of the storm drain system.
- Shovel, absorb, or vacuum saw-cut slurry and pick up all waste as soon as you are finished in one location or at the end of each work day (whichever is
- If saw cut slurry enters a catch basin, clean it up immediately.

Paving/asphalt work



- ✓ Always cover storm drain inlets and manholes when paving or applying seal coat, tack coat, slurry seal, or fog seal.
- Protect gutters, ditches, and drainage courses with sand/gravel bags, or earthen berms.
- Do not sweep or wash down excess sand from sand sealing into gutters, storm drains, or creeks. Collect sand and return it to the stockpile, or dispose of it as trash
- Do not use water to wash down fresh asphalt concrete pavement.

Concrete, grout, and mortar storage & waste disposal

- ✓ Store concrete, grout, and mortar under cover, on pallets, and away from drainage areas. These materials must never reach a

Collect the wash water from washing exposed aggregate concrete and remove it for appropriate disposal off site.

Painting

- ✓ Never rinse paint brushes or materials in a gutter or street Paint out excess water-base paint before rinsing brushes, rollers, or containers in a sink
- Paint out excess oil-based paint before cleaning brushes in thinner. Filter paint thinners and solvents for reuse whenever possible.
- Dispose of oil-based paint sludge and unusable thinner as hazardous waste.

Landscape Materials

- Contain, cover, and store on pallets all stockpiled landscape materials (mulch, compost, fertilizers, etc.) during wet weather or when rain is forecasted or when not actively being used within 14 days.
- ✓ Discontinue the application of any erodible landscape material within 2 days of forecasted rain and during wet weather.


