San Antonio Park Survey Analysis - Key Trends and Consensus

Survey Overview

Total Respondents: 110

Language Distribution: English (63), Cantonese (22), Spanish (20), Mam (5)

Major Findings & Strong Consensus Areas

1. Clear Preference for Option B (68% overall)

• Strong consensus across all language groups except English speakers

• Spanish: 90% chose Option B

Cantonese: 91% chose Option B

• Mam: 100% chose Option B

• English: 51% chose Option B (more split)

Key reasons for Option B preference:

• Better/bigger exercise/fitness area

More games and activities for children

• Cleaner design without dogs (safety concern)

• More organized layout

2. Overwhelming Support for Fitness Area Over Dog Park

- 81% prefer fitness area when forced to choose between dog park vs. exercise area
- Spanish speakers: 80% fitness area, 0% dog park
- Cantonese speakers: 82% fitness area, 0% dog park
- Mam speakers: 100% fitness area, 0% dog park
- English speakers: 43% fitness area, 19% dog park, 33% want both

3. Safety and Cleanliness Are Top Priorities

Barriers to current park use:

- Violence and drunk people (consistent across Spanish and English responses)
- Dirty conditions and broken equipment
- Drug use and homeless encampments

Lack of security

What would increase usage:

- Better security and safety measures
- Cleaner facilities and working equipment
- More games and activities for children

4. Strong Support for Accessible Design

- Option B preferred for 17th Street accessible path (48% vs 32% for Option A)
- Particularly strong among Cantonese (55%) and Mam (100%) speakers

Community Priorities by Feature

Most Valued Elements:

- 1. Sliding equipment 78% support (highest across all activities)
- 2. Traditional swings 75% of Spanish speakers, 78% of English speakers
- 3. Nature/natural elements 54% overall preference for sensory play
- 4. Mosaic seatwalls and restroom murals Top choices for public art

Preferred Reductions (if necessary):

- 1. Rubber surfacing area (33% of English speakers willing to reduce)
- 2. Number of swings (25% of Spanish speakers)
- 3. Play structure for ages 2-5 (25% of English speakers)

Language Group Differences

Spanish-Speaking Community:

- Strongest preference for Option B (90%)
- High value on exercise areas and children's games
- Concerned about dog safety around children
- Want more security and cleanliness

Cantonese-Speaking Community:

- Strong preference for Option B (91%)
- High usage rates (32% use daily)

- Value fitness facilities and rope/net play
- Want clean, safe environment

Mam-Speaking Community:

- Unanimous support for Option B (100%)
- Strong focus on children's safety and cleanliness
- Want area "clean without animals"
- Interested in community activities like weaving areas

English-Speaking Community:

- More divided on options (51% Option B vs 49% Option A)
- Higher interest in dog parks (though still minority)
- More open to "wanting both" options
- Diverse range of suggestions and concerns

Key Consensus Points Across All Groups

Universal Agreement:

- 1. Current park needs major improvements safety, cleanliness, equipment
- 2. Children's play areas are the top priority
- 3. Fitness/exercise areas are more valuable than dog parks
- 4. Nature elements and trees are important
- 5. Accessible design is essential

Safety Concerns Consistent Across Languages:

- Drunk and disorderly behavior
- Drug use and homeless encampments
- Broken/unsafe equipment
- Need for better lighting and security

Recommendations Based on Consensus

High Priority (Strong Multi-Language Support):

- 1. Implement Option B design clear preference across most groups
- 2. Prioritize fitness/exercise area over dog park

- 3. Focus on safety and security improvements
- 4. Include accessible path Option B design
- 5. Maintain traditional swings and sliding equipment
- 6. Incorporate nature/natural play elements

Address Community Concerns:

- 1. Enhanced security and lighting
- 2. Regular maintenance and cleaning protocols
- 3. Water fountains (requested across multiple languages)
- 4. More picnic tables and seating
- 5. Public art focusing on mosaic elements and murals

Consider Language-Specific Needs:

- 1. Multilingual signage and wayfinding
- 2. Cultural elements reflecting community diversity
- 3. **Community programming spaces** (weaving area mentioned by Mam speakers)

Conclusion

The survey reveals strong consensus around prioritizing children's safety and play, fitness facilities for families, and creating a clean, secure environment. While there are some differences between language groups, the overwhelming preference for Option B and fitness areas over dog parks provides clear direction for the design process. The community's primary concerns center on transforming the current park from a space perceived as unsafe and neglected into a vibrant, family-friendly community asset.
