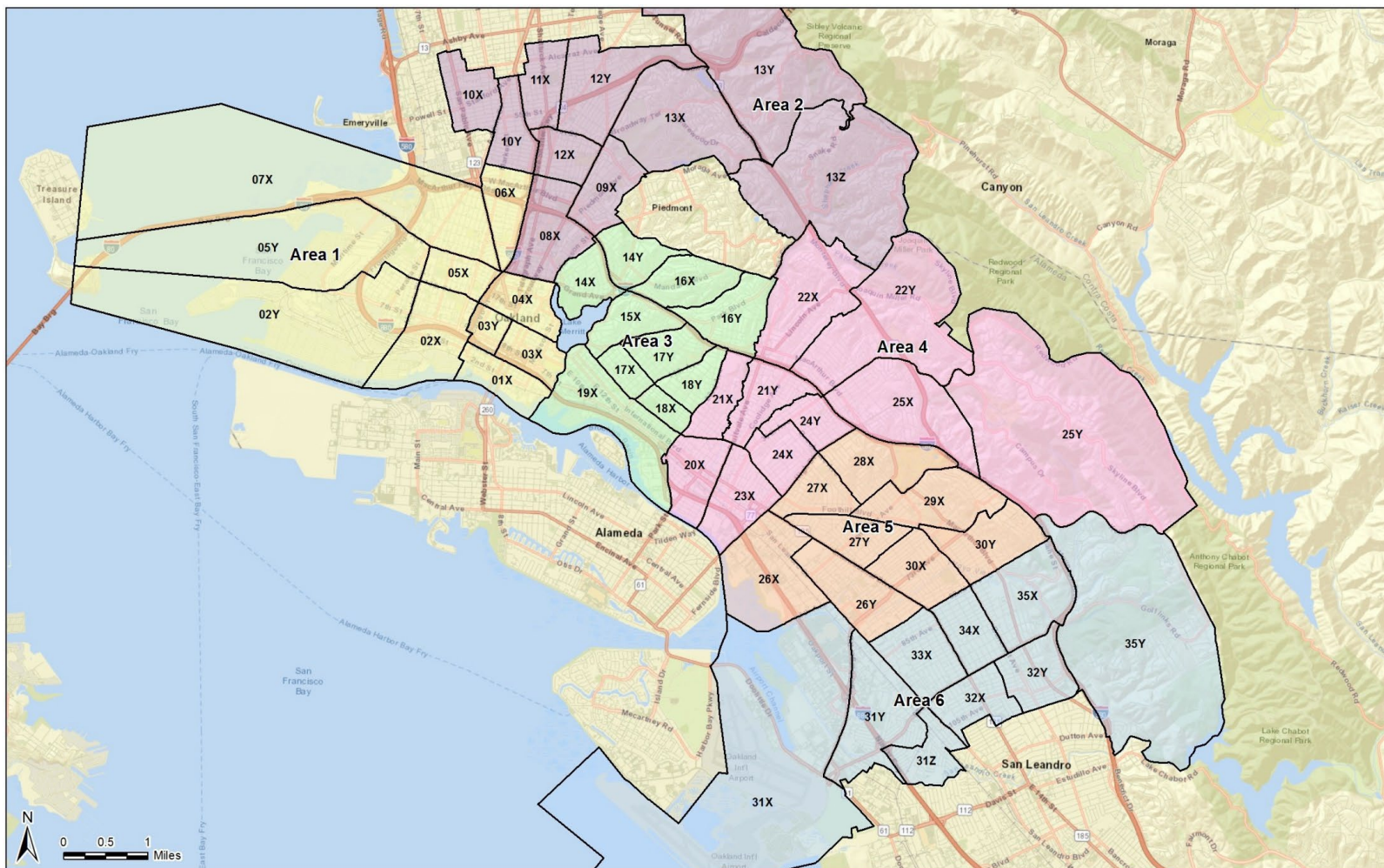

CPAB Ad hoc Subcommittee - RESO 79235 WORK PLAN - **Update May 27, 2026**

Overall objective of reso ad hoc work: *Update the existing Community Policing and Public Safety Reso 79235 to reassert its structural importance and the need for sustained buy-in from the City and neighborhood councils, and to enhance its effectiveness as formally adopted policy towards the goal of promoting and emphasizing neighborhood empowerment, community capacity building, public health, as well as community safety.*

Per consensus agreement and review of the CPAB, this update is based on the identified needs to:

- Update the 20-year-old existing reso (from 2005).
- Reassert the structural significance and importance of the reso and the City's accountability to this community-oriented mandate (bring it back to the fore of everyone's minds). Recent actions seemingly directly counter the existing reso leaving its on-going relevance and applicability in question (e.g. elimination of NSD which was already unilaterally moved out of city admin office to public works; failure to hold an annual summit and so forth).
- Reorient focus more from policing/OPD orientation to neighborhood empowerment, public health, community safety, and proactive grassroots-level neighborhood involvement; while re-emphasizing the focus on cross-level engagement, coordination, City safety policy information sharing and development, and long-term city structural investment.
- Reassert the NCs as key functional strategic organization of the city with a need for commensurate sustained oversight/liaison staffing, technical assistance, and other resources.
- Assure the NC structure is sufficiently aligned and coordinated with on-going updates to City General Plan and future citywide planning, capital improvement, and other neighborhood health and resiliency initiatives.

Sub-task goals: **Updated**

- Conduct research on similar models of Municipal-enabled and supported neighborhood level capacity/empowerment building structures. Hear summary reports on these, glean for any potential lessons, best practices. **Started and done for Seattle, Los Angeles, NY. Others: Memphis?**
- Conduct comprehensive citywide outreach and input gathering strategy on potential update directions. **Underway – complete this phase by June 30th – report back summary to board in July's meeting.**
- Develop a draft updated/revised reso based on a “red-lined” version of existing and bring back to full CPAB for consideration, review, and action. **Start this drafting in June based on existing reso (redline) – bring or submit ideas for a special June working session. **Proposals made must be justified based on goals of this committee viz CPAB and how it directly addresses or is not contradicting summary of responses.**
- Keep abreast of and liaise with Measure NN commission and the development of their workplan as appropriate and relevant concerns of community policing and neighborhood safety. **Attempted and on-going – upcoming City Council meeting, letter?**

BI-MONTHLY TIMELINE (July 2025 – December 2026) Updated

- **June – July** - Orientation and initiation – start up monthly ad hoc sub-committee; Develop one-pager of intent of update; invite former CPAB and current board members who were involved in prior efforts to report out. Hear from City staff and Mayor's office as applicable. **[Met with DRE]**
- **August – September** - Forward one-pagers to NC's, PTAs, BIDs and other groups. Seek to get input on overall goals of update. Hear their concerns and reactions. Invite anyone to attend ad hoc meetings and/or CPAB. CPAB Chairs to give report to City Council and include mention that this update is occurring.
- **October-November** – Hear and discuss findings and lessons from research and input from outreach **May and June**
- **December-January** – Committee to compile and seek agreement on basic directions and types of inclusions/restructuring etc. for update. Give update to CPAB for approval of direction. **July**
- **February-March** - Meet with City CMs to share intended directions of update and update new on-pager for outreach. Create red-lined draft ready for public circulation and input. **July**
- **Return with final draft version to Board - September**
- **Hold Press Release and open house on reso – National Neighborhood Day Sep 28th**
- **April-May** - Meet with NCs and others as applicable to get input. Develop a second draft.
- **June-July** – Bring final draft to CPAB for discussion and consideration (two readings) **Oct-Nov**
